Concept Note:

The one-day interdisciplinary international webinar titled "DEMOCRACY, EDUCATION AND HUMAN RIGHTS DISCOURSES: DEBATES AND DILEMMAS" was jointly organized by the Department of Political Science at Muralidhar Girls' College in Kolkata and the SPARSH Society.
