HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

Muralidhar Girls' College began as a girls' school with a small number of students in 1919. The founder was Sri Muralidhar Bandyopadhyay, Principal of Sanskrit College, a well-known scholar and educationist, whose dream was to inspire in young women the ideals of national tradition and culture. His dream was fulfilled later on July 8th, 1940 when the school developed into Ballygunge Girls' College with the distinguished educationist Sri Nalini Mohan Shastri as Principal. In 1945 the College was permanently affiliated to the University of Calcutta and a year later it was renamed Muralidhar Girls' College as a mark of respect to the founder's memory. His worthy son, Sri HironmoyBandyopadhyay, IAS, Ex Vice-Chancellor, RabindraBharati University, became Vice President of the College Governing Body and arranged a grant of ₹ 3 lakh from the Government of India for the construction of a 3 storied building on Gariahat Road, where the college has since been housed. The College is at present enlisted in the UGC panel of recognized colleges (in West Bengal) under section 2(f) & 12(B) of the UGC Act. It is also registered under West Bengal Societies Registration Act, 1961. The total land area of the College is 0.25253 acre, over which it has undisputed ownership. The total constructed area is 3134.5 square metres

A. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Quality Policy of the college states - "Muralidhar Girls' College is committed to excellence in modern education, training, research, entrepreneurship, career development and placement services to the optimistic satisfaction of our stakeholders."

Established in 1940, Muralidhar Girls' College, Kolkata is a unique platform of Education, Training, and Research aimed towards 'Women Empowerment'. The College is affiliated to the University of Calcutta since 1945 and approved by the UGC under section 12(b) and 2(f).

Our **vision** is the empowerment and enlightenment of women through value-based and quality education so as to foster informed global minds. The Institution also has a proactive role in enabling the girl students for income generation and sensitizing them to international issues, so that they become truly equipped global citizens.

The **mission** of the college is succinctly expressed through our motto **ATMADIPO BHABO**. The institution aims at holistic development of unexplored potential of our students. The mission of the institution is consonant with the Millennium Development Goal – 'Promote gender equality and empower women' (UNDP, Human Development Report 2002) and the National Education Policy to extend equal socio-technological opportunities to all the students.

The **objective** of the College is to provide education and training, to support students in developing professional competencies, to encourage research, and take measures to address social and environmental concerns irrespective of culture, caste, creed, religion, region, political affiliation and socio-economic status.

At present the College offers 13(thirteen) subjects for Honours studies (English, Bengali, Sanskrit, Journalism & Mass Communication, Political Science, Philosophy, History, Education, Sociology, Economics, Psychology, Geography, Botany), along with B.A. and B.Sc. General course wherein the students can choose 3 subjects from a wide variety of combinations and 1(one) Self-Financing course in Tourism and Travel Management. The College has an intake capacity of 1000 students in the first year. We have a strong faculty dedicated towards fulfilling the dreams of the students, many of whom are first generation learners. Along with curricular studies they try to create and disseminate an atmosphere of inclusive learning and research keeping pace with the challenges of globalization of education and advanced information technology. The Governing Body, Principal, faculty and all staff have a proactive role in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans.

Curriculum Design and Development:

- 1. The College offers a wide variety of Under Graduate degree programmes including a **Self-Financing** program.
- 2. As per the changing market demand the College introduced training program on **Soft Skill Development** (training of IT & IT-Enabled services and Spoken English).

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- 3. In addition, the College started its journey as a **Regular Study Centre** (*Code 28140*) of Indira Gandhi Open University (IGNOU, New Delhi). Currently the College offers 11 Master Degree programmes, 1 Bachelor Degree program, 3 Post Graduate Diploma program, 1 Diploma program through IGNOU. UGC Add-On courses and many more programmes from IGNOU are in line of introduction by the College, very shortly.
- 4. On the basis of **feedback** topics and subject from time to time. The Institute involves industry, research bodies and society in curriculum design and development to ensure relevancy and industry readiness of its programmes. Electives are offered at under graduate level in terms of specialization.
- 5. The majority of the programmes offered by the College have **yearly examination system, as per Calcutta University rules (Part-I, Part-II, and Part-III) along with Mid-Term, Test Examination, and innovative departmental examinations.**
- 6. Some of the full-time faculties are **active member of Board of Studies** who is in a position to review and revise university curricular every year.
- 7. The College offers **flexibility of choice of subject combinations** in Honours and General courses, both, for the students.

Teaching Learning Evaluation:

- 1. The College admission process is widely publicized and transparent through **fully computerized and online system**. Periodic review of enrolment profile (diversified student groups) is done to judge current scenario. **Statutory reservation policies are implemented meticulously.**
- 2. After assessing the learning levels of the students, after admission the College plans, organizes, and implements teaching-learning schedule (Academic Calendar) at the beginning of each academic session in consultation with Academic Sub-Committee, Discipline Sub-Committee, and respective HODs. Special emphasis is given for differently-abled, slow, and advanced learners.
- 3. **Active Learning process** through Micro Teaching, Group Discussion, PowerPoint Presentation, Experiential Learning, Participative Learning, and Problem Solving Methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences. Latest technologies are used through E-Learning resources.
- 4. The College always priorities **Projects** / **Field experiences followed by a mentor-mentee system** to meet the academic and personal needs of students. Feedback on the evaluation of teachers through Principal-Class Representatives meeting is explored to improve the quality of teaching-learning process.
- 5. Time-to-Time requisitions are submitted to the West Bengal College Service Commission for filling up of vacant sanctioned posts. Teachers are always encouraged for refresher, orientation, and different faculty development programmes.
- 6. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation procedure of the College is in a process of continuous evolution through **innovative methods and best practices**. Some of them are:
- * 'Darpan' (Audio-Visual media based learning),
- Technical analysis
- Lectures through Skype,

- Workshops, Seminars, Live-Wire,
- * 'Prachesta' (Case Study Contest),
- * 'Sristi' (Project Competition),
- * 'Vabna' (Photography & Documentary Film contest using Computer),
- "Sobuj Prithibi" (Adventure Sports, Mountaineering, and Nature Study based learning),
- * 'Aeksathe' (NCC & NSS lead Social Projects),

Research, Consultancy and Extension:

- 1. The College has a committee named 'MGC-Research Wing' to promote and encourage research activities. Policy statement of research is "Invent, Explore, Promote, and Encourage research climate involving core and interdisciplinary subjects for the benefit of students, teachers, as well as the society, where we exist."
- 2. **Budgetary provision** is planned by the College for research works.
- 3. The College provides room, laboratory equipment, research journals, library access (*books*, *CD/DVD*), computer systems with multimedia facilities, Printer, Scanner, high bandwidth LAN, and internet connection, **online national library resources** for the teachers to pursue research activities in their respective Seminar Rooms. Research infrastructure is upgraded regularly with Annual Maintenance contracts.
- 4. 20 full time teachers are there with PhD. to guide research projects.
- 5. The College encourages and promotes a research culture through teaching work load remission, granting leave for research activities, opportunities for attending conferences, presentation of research papers of relevant topics.
- 6. Workshops, Seminars, Training programmes, Sensitization programmes on Research Methodologies are organized in the College.
- 7. Significant faculty involvement in Minor Research Projects with UGC grant is evident. Research projects of Interdepartmental / interdisciplinary nature are undertaken. **Malpractices and Plagiarism** in research are strictly checked.
- 8. **Research awards and recognition** are received by the faculty from reputed professional bodies. Passed out students, pursuing their **M.Phil** in Universities are significant.
- 9. The College has a publication of research journal 'Quest' with ISBN / ISSN. In addition significant numbers of research articles are published in reputed / refereed journals.
- 10. NSS / NCC activities are organized as Extension Activities and their impact on the community goes through a cycle of evaluation, review and upgrading the Extension Programmes. Best Cadet Award is received by the NCC and NSS students from Army and Calcutta University, respectively. The College distributes Admission Forms to join in NCC / NSS to the 1st year students at the time of admission and has a mechanism to track the students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote Citizenship Roles and Institutional Social Responsibilities (ISR).
- 11. The College has linkages with other colleges for various activities such as **Faculty Exchange, Student Placement** to enhance its academic profile. For examples linkage with *'Sangbad Protidin'*, *'Times of India'* for

- internship of Journalism and Mass Communication students, linkage with 'Satyajit Ray Film and Television Institute' for Film Studies students, linkage with the 'Jute and Fiber Technology Institute' for vocational training, linkage with the 'West Bengal Tourism Development Corporation' for on-the-job training of Tourism & Travel Management students etc.
- 12. Future Plan Collaboration / Partnership with Industry / Community / NGOs, for highly specialized laboratories and contribution to industry requirements, Inviting sponsored project from industries, Consultancy to IGNOU research students, Establishment of Research Unit / Centre to address the special challenges of research programmes, Undertaking Major Research Projects, Incentives to faculties pursuing research works, File Patent etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

- 1. The College provides facilities for Teaching-Learning for **Laboratories** (Botany, Chemistry, Geography, Psychology, and Journalism & Mass Communication), Furniture, Fixtures, and Equipment and effective laboratory practices. Teachers and HODs are there to ensure optimum use of laboratories by the students.
- 2. **ICT training** of students are provided once for 2 hours in every week for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd year students using **Smart-Room** (equipped with Smartboard, Projector, Multimedia Computer, TV / DVD player, Digital Still & Video Camera, Audio Recorder, Internet, Printer, Scanner, and Phone with Fax). All facilities are upgraded from time to time.
- 3. The College facilitates academic participation of **physically disabled students** (**PWD**) by providing **Ramp**, **Lift**, **Wheel-Chair**, **Special Toilet** etc.
- 4. **Health Unit** is there with medical equipment, emergency medicines to provide health services for students, teaching and non-teaching staffs. College appointed **visiting doctor** takes care of medical problems concerned.
- 5. **Subsidized Canteen** facilities with quality foods are available. **Tiffin Time** is allotted for students, teachers, library staffs, and non-teaching personnel.
- 6. The **Library Committee** is responsible for the smooth and effective functioning of the general library as well as Seminar Libraries.
- 7. The library is **computerized with internet facility** and networked with other libraries like **American Library**, **BCL**, **INFLIBNET**, Calcutta University Online Library, and State Libraries. **Inter-Library Loan** is available.
- 8. The general library of the College has physical facilities like Reading Room, Reprography, Internet, and **more than 38000 books**. Book titles per student (in the general library) excluding book bank are sufficient. In addition the library is stocked with number of **journals (national & international), CDs/ DVDs** etc. **Library resources are upgraded** every year with newer editions and titles.
- 9. The College provides effective and user-friendly library operations such as library membership, issue and return of books, fine collection, getting the necessary references, **stock maintenance** etc. The library **collects**

- **feedback** from students, teachers, and incorporates the suggestions for its better functioning.
- 10. Facilities for Sports (Playground, Common Room, TT Coaching, Yoga Coaching, Coaching for Self Defense, Indoor Games like Carom, Outdoor Games like Track & Field) and Extra-Curricular activities (Gymnasium, Auditorium, Conference Room) are provided. The College conducts Mountaineering and Adventure Sports Camps in association with Indian Mountaineering Foundation every year.
- 11. Faculties are provided with the **Multimedia Computer**, **Digital Still & Video Camera**, **Audio Recorder**, **Internet**, **Printer**, **and Scanner** for preparation of computer aided teaching learning material.
- 12. **Budget provision** is made for purchase, upgrading and maintenance of computers. Financial aids from the UGC and College Fund are allocated for established procedures and systems for maintenance of infrastructure, which are utilized in total (*Utilization Certificate submitted*) for the **planned activities**. The College **frequently upgrades its IT facility** and has up-to-date computing facilities hardware and software.
- 13. The College is connected with the National Knowledge Network.

Student Support and Progression:

- 1. Free-ships, Scholarships and/or fees concessions and books are provided by the College to students, who are regular in classes, having good results, but are economically weak and do not receive any other stipend or benefits from the government. The concessions are given to the students of all three years from the Students' Aid Fund.
- 2. IQAC in consultation with stake holders and approval from the Governing Body have started the few self-designed and self-financed soft skill development courses and proposes few more, along with other degree courses to fulfill its commitment to achieve the goals and objectives reflecting its vision and mission. The college offers: Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management and Communication skills in English.
- 3. The Tourism and Travel Management (TTMV) department have a formal arrangement with **West Bengal Tourism Development Corporation Ltd.** (A Govt. of West Bengal Undertaking). The corporation imparts hands on training to the students of the Travel and Tourism Management for 6 months. A monthly stipend is paid to the students.
- 4. The college provides opportunity of enrolling into Courses on Jute Handicrafts & Jute Diversified Product (JDP) conducted by Department of Jute and Fibre Technology, Institute of Jute Technology, University of Calcutta, sponsored from Development Commissioner (Handicrafts) (DCH), Ministry of Textiles, Govt. of India, and New Delhi under DCH-HRD Training Programme through established Institutions.
- 5. Currently we have an arrangement with **RICE and George Telegraph** institutions which have significant expertise in **competitive examination coaching.**
- 6. Unmarried students from **economically weaker sections receive Rs. 25,000/-** at-a-time from the Government of West Bengal, under 'Kanyashree Prakalpa', through this college. This one-time grant under

- social welfare scheme is provided to support women education, to check early marriage, and to reduce drop-out rate of girl students. Provision of SC/ST stipend is there also. Attendance of students is strictly maintained (minimum 75% is must). The College conducts special counselling sessions to check drop-out rate.
- 7. College results are always under scanner for betterment of pass percentage. Detection of Slow and Advanced Learners, Remedial Class, special coaching classes, tutorials are some of the mechanisms in this regard.
- 8. The institution has a **Placement Cell** which helps to identify job opportunities and develop entrepreneurship skills.
- 9. Information about the institution is publicly accessible through college website (<u>www.muralidhargirlscollege.org</u>), notice circulated in each class, and college notice board in each floor.
- 10. Student participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities is encouraged through different interactive clubs (*Drama, Recitation, Quiz, Drama, Nature club*) of the College.
- 11. The progression of students in various programmes of the institution is regularly monitored.
- 12. The College has a **registered Alumni Association** which contributes significantly to the development plans of the institution.
- 13. The institution has committees for timely **Redressal of student Grievances, prevention of sexual (gender) harassment**, and an **Anti-Ragging Committee** which monitors student interactions.
- 14. Sports and Games (Indoor/Outdoor) are of special importance in Muralidhar Girls' College. The College adheres with the **Sports Policy of the Government** and provides coaching for **Table Tennis**, **Karate**, **Yoga**, **Track & Field etc.** Students take part in **Inter-College Sports Competitions of the University**, regularly.
- 15. NCC / NSS / Mountaineering and Adventure Club of the College contribute to overall development of students. Numbers of remarkable achievements are there by NCC / NSS members of the College. We are very proud of their performances in State / National / and International level.
- 16. Publication of materials like wall magazines, departmental magazines (*SCRIBE*, *INSIGNIA*, *LEKHONI*), institution magazine (*SUPARNA*), are encouraged by the College.
- 17. Active student participation through **Student Union** is encouraged. Election process of Students' Union is followed as per the Government rules. Elected Body of the Union is very active and supportive in their year-long developmental activities. **Union representation is must in the Governing Body.**
- 18. In addition the Principal regularly meet the Class Representatives to share their views / opinions / and grievances. Republic Day, Saraswati Puja, Sanskrit Day, Parents' Day, Tourism Fare, Teachers Day, Anandamela College Social, Fresher Welcome, Fest etc. are organized by the students, mainly.
- 19. **Feedback** from students, parents, and other stakeholders is used for planning and developing support services.

Governance, Leadership and Management:

- 1. The vision, mission and goals of Muralidhar Girls' College are carefully tuned with the objectives of women empowerment and higher education. The Governance of the College is in line with GOI / State Govt. policies and reflective of an effective and dynamic leadership of the Principal Dr. Kinjalkini Biswas. She leads our college with the help of an elected Governing Body, Finance Committee, BURSAR, IQAC, Teachers Council, and a very efficient college office. We practice decentralization and participative management from students, teachers / non-teaching staffs, parents, and other prospective stakeholders. The College formulates its strategic planning, monitors and evaluates its policies and plans and interacts with stakeholders. The College grooms leadership at students, teaching / non-teaching staff levels.
- 2. The College has a well **defined Quality Policy**, **Action Plan**, Strategy development and deployment process with **systems perspective**. It has schedules for major activities, and **future development** plans. **Grievance Redressal Cell**, **and Student Satisfaction Survey** is integral input factor for all policies of the institution.
- 3. The College takes sustained interest in recruitment and promotion aspects of its employees and strictly adheres to GOI / State Govt. policies on recruitment (access, equity, gender sensitivity and physically disabled). Refresher Course, Orientation Programme, Faculty Development Programme, Research Fellowship, Board of Studies membership, Examiner, Paper Setter, Zonal In-Charge etc. are some of the programmes and responsibilities through which the College encourages to enhance the competency of its faculty and non-teaching staff. The College conducts ICT training programme for professional development of its staff. The College ensures transparent use of Performance Appraisal Reports.
- 4. The College is in process of introducing an effective **welfare mechanism** for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 5. Finance Committee **prepares budget** for a financial year, using **standard financial management method** of budget preparation subject to approval from the Governing Body. Budgets are prepared considering all possible corners of income and expenditure. **Optimal utilization of budget** is strictly adhered to by the College.
- 6. Department / Section / Unit have to raise requisition of purchase with budget / estimate and place to the **BURSAR** for necessary approval. UGC and State Government grants are utilized against valid requisition from departments within a pre-conditioned time frame.
- 7. **Utilization. Certificates** are generated in Government prescribed format
- 8. **Asset Registers** are maintained department-wise, financial year-wise and planned expenditure-wise.
- 9. Audit Report is generated for submission to the Governing Body. Last audit was done for the financial year 2013-2014. Major sources of institutional receipts / funding are Monthly fees from students, UGC grant. State Government grant through College Sponsored branch, Education Directorate, Government of West Bengal. The College maintains a Reserve Fund.
- 10. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed

significantly to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes. **External members** contribute significantly in the functioning of the IQAC.

Innovations and Best Practices:

- 1. The College installed **5Kv Solar Power Station on the college rooftop to inject Solar Energy** i.e., a **renewable source of energy**, into the main electricity supply line of the College from the Calcutta Electric Supply Corporation.
- 2. To promote paper-less transactions the College uses Electronic Media, as much as possible. Use of college website and social media for information exchange, online admission for honours and general courses, computerization of office and library are some of the vital steps taken in this regard.
- 3. The college has many Extra / Co-Curricular activities and these are practiced regularly. The **innovative part** of this practice is that the college is giving so much importance to all these activities that they are not only treated as **Extra or Co-Curricular** subjects but are getting a new dimension **dissolved into the main curriculum**.
- 4. The college arranges many seminars and workshops which are of 'immense importance 'to subsequent departments. Our innovative practice to find out different inter-disciplinary areas from the proceedings of the seminars and workshops and submit those points to the respective departments. As a matter of fact the students go through the proceedings of the seminars and workshops meticulously and point out the areas focused and helpful to other departments. This will help not only the concerned departments but the other department also can reap the benefit from the expert analysis.
- 5. The students' activities to neighborhood extension services include research work too. Through these research projects, they gather information, analyze them and write reports on that. These reports are then submitted to the respected Municipal and Administrative bodies. There lies the innovative practice that the students not only do the research but they also submit the reports to the concerned authority so that they cannot use those information and analyzes for any developmental work.
- 6. ICT & E GOVERNANCE: The College is 75 years old and along with time the institution has stepped forward into Digital age. The administrative and day to day work of the office is done through computers. A Workstation has been installed in the Principal's room to monitor the entire function of the college. The Administrative Office, Cash and Accounts Section, General and Seminar Libraries, each Department is connected to the Principal's workstation through Computer Network (LAN) that helps the Head of the institution to get any information at one click and whenever it is necessary. High Bandwidth BSNL Internet connection, Biometric System Server and CCTV Server is also deployed in the Principal's Room. The Principal not only monitors the system but also administers it to keep the data secured.
- **7.** E-waste management: Purchase of Electronic Data Processing (EDP) equipment are done through exchange offer with older machines of the College to avoid dumping of e-waste. Invalid computer systems are given

- to those agencies that have the infrastructure of proper e-waste management. Environment friendly EDP devices are purchased.
- 8. NCC / NSS: Muralidhar Girls' College feels extremely proud of its NCC and NSS units. Right from fresh admission, students are informed and encouraged to take membership in NCC and NSS. Student response remains very high. Participation in Republic Day Parade in New Delhi and State, Adventure camps, Community / Social development projects transforms them into excellent human being. Best Cadet, Best College, Best Officer are the rewards which our college is habituated to receive. But irrespective of awards and recognitions from university, state, and national level we are committed to save our earth from every threat of unhealthy exploitation so that future generation can breathe freely.

The Institution also has a proactive role in enabling the girl student for income generation and sensitizing them to international issues, so that they become truly equipped global citizens.

Mission: The mission of the college is succinctly expressed through our motto **ATMADIPO BHABO**. The institution aims at holistic development of unexplored potential of our students. The mission of the institution is consonant with the Millennium Development Goal – 'Promote gender equality and empower women' (UNDP, Human Development Report 2002) and the National Education Policy to extend equal socio-technological opportunities to all the students.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

For effective implementation of the curriculum well-structured action plans are developed and deployed by the institution:

- The college implements the curricula designed by its affiliating University, the University of Calcutta, in all its Under Graduate courses.
- The college prepares an Academic Calendar for each session in accordance with the schedule provided by the University
- To monitor academic performance, the Principal holds regular meetings with IQAC, Academic Sub-Committee comprising of HODs of different departments and Class-Representatives to discuss matters related to teaching plans, methods and performance of students – Strategies are worked out on basis of this.
- Departmental meetings are held to effectively frame and implement term-wise syllabus
- Mid-Term Test, Class Tests and Tutorials are regularly held to check the performance of the students and on the basis of that

- Remedial classes are taken for the weaker students.
- Encouragement is given to the faculty to adopt innovative and effective methods of teaching that cater to the needs of the learners
- ICT based learning has been introduced in all departments. Both teachers and students use internet facility to procure study materials.
- Along with traditional chalk and talk method, use of Smart Class-room is encouraged
- Assignments, Projects, Term-Papers, Practical Works, Fieldtrip, Survey are regular part of teaching method
- Reference Books are made available to the students
- On-line Library facility is made available to the students. Eresources are easily accessible to the students.
- Students are encouraged to go beyond the syllabus and are initiated to basic research methodology.
- Student friendly atmosphere is ensured.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Teachers receive procedural and practical support for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices both from University and College.

Support received from the University:

- University of Calcutta has Board of Studies to determine the curriculum and its implementation in each subject. Some of our teaching faculty are members of the Board of Studies.
- Information concerning the syllabus, notifications of changes, as also question patterns is provided in the University website.
- The University also provides an Academic Calendar, with a specific examination schedule and proposed time for results.
- Workshops, as also, Refresher and Orientation courses are regularly conducted by the University to allow the faculty to update their knowledge.

Support given by the college:

- At the start of the session the Principal calls an Academic Sub-Committee meeting for determining the implementation of the syllabus, adopting innovative teaching-learning methodology, and ensuring a student-friendly atmosphere.
- According to the requirements of the changed syllabus, the stock of books are upgraded utilizing the UGC grants, if available and/or from the college funds.
- The college organizes faculty enrichment programmes and provides all forms of infrastructural facilities to improve teaching practices.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

With a focus on the overall personality development of the students the college takes the following initiatives, for effective curriculum delivery and its transaction:

- Effective implementation and execution of the syllabus and changes made there in by the University.
- Preparing academic calendar including term-wise syllabus break-up and ensuring its compliance through departmental meeting.
- Maintaining Academic Progress Report with due consideration of student feedback.
- Conducting meeting at various levels to make strategies for improving teaching methods and implementing innovative learning through use of ICT.
- Updating the college website with the latest information and notifications and using it for providing learning tips to the students.
- Up-gradation and modification of existing infrastructure especially laboratories as per requirements of the syllabi.
- Upgrading library resources and e-learning facilities and encouraging the students (both slow and advanced) to make optimum use of library resources and e-learning resources.
- Remedial classes organized for slow learners.
- To make the learning process more student centric, students are made to participate in group discussions, micro teaching and are given assignments to make PowerPoint Presentations.
- Subject experts are invited to give special lectures on different topics included in the syllabi.
- For the benefit of the students bilingual lectures are given.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The college networks and interacts with different beneficiaries for effective operationalization of the curriculum in the following manner:

Industry:

 The Journalism and Mass Communication department have an informal arrangement with the Media sector, both print and electronic, to have practical exposure of the concepts taught to them as per demand of the curriculum. Different experts from established Media Houses and ex-students of the college from

- Media sector come and share their experience and expertise with the students. The exposures thus gained have led to impressive employment statistics.
- The Tourism and Travel Management (TTMV) department has a formal arrangement with West Bengal Tourism Development Corporation Ltd. (A Govt. of West Bengal Undertaking). The corporation imparts hands on training to the students of the Travel and Tourism Management as per the curricula for 6 months. A monthly stipend is paid to the students.
- The College has a Career Development and Placement Cell which effectively involves experts from the industry who impart their knowledge to the students and advice regarding career path.

University:

 All the faculty members are intimately connected with evaluation process of the University including Paper-Setting, Moderation of Question Paper, conducting Zonal Centre, Head-Examinership/ Coordinator, Correction and Scrutiny of answer scripts etc. These experiences generate important feedbacks which are immensely valuable in operationalization of the curriculum and guiding the students in the teaching-learning and evaluation process.

Research Bodies:

- The college has its own research body- MGC Research Wing which supervises the research activities of the faculty and students.
- It encourages the faculty for undertaking Minor Research Projects under UGC.
- <u>Future Plan</u>: It proposes to collaborate with other Research Bodies for their assistance e.g. dialogue is on with UNICEF to collaborate in various research areas.
- 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University are:

- Departments who have no representation in Board of Studies, sends suggestions on development of curriculum on the basis of teacher feedback and student feedback.

Yes, the college has developed curriculum for soft skill development courses other than those under the purview of the affiliating university. The college offers:

- a) Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management
- b) Communication skills in English

Computer Fundamentals& Internet Applications for Office Management:

Needs Assessment:

In the changing global scenario, the requirements that ensure employability in the workplace have changed. A college and university degree alone does not suffice employability. The market demand, student interests and feedback from stakeholders initiated the college to design and develop the curriculum for the course.

Design, Development and Planning:

The duration of the course is three months. Keeping the time frame available for completion of regular curriculum study during the academic session the three months duration has been decided upon. The target is to imbibe skill in as many students as possible.

The course includes Hardware Essentials, Software Essentials, Networking and Internet Essentials with front and back office techniques and Computer Security essentials.

Communication skills in English:

Needs Assessment:

As English is the most widely used language for office use and communication, the college feels the necessity for introducing spoken English course for all the students.

Design, Development and Planning:

The duration of the course is three months. Keeping the time frame available for completion of regular curriculum study during the academic session the three months duration has been decided upon. The target is to imbibe communication skill in English in as many students as possible, specifically for those who are from vernacular background.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The college adopts the following measures to analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved:

- Each department periodically conducts meetings of faculty members to discuss the progress of academic activities and assumes corrective steps.
- Academic Sub-Committee meetings are convened from time to time to evaluate student progress and academic

achievements. The committee meets to analyze the implementation of the curriculum in time.

- At the end of each examination (Departmental Tests, Mid-Term Examination and Test Examination), Academic Sub-Committee conducts a result analysis, and suggests corrective measures.
- These matters are then discussed in the IQAC meetings periodically. The IQAC is there to ensure that the syllabus is completed in time and that continuous evaluations are conducted periodically.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

The institution aims at holistic development of the potential of our students. The goal is to promote gender equality and empower women so as to extend equal socio-technological opportunities to all the students. The objective is to empower them scientifically through Information and Communication Technology (ICT) enabled education to face global challenges and imbibe in them global level competency, employability and self-development.

The college proposes to apply for a number of Add-on courses for approval to the UGC under the category of career-oriented courses. However keeping in mind the market demand and student interests, the IQAC in consultation with stake holders and approval from the Governing Body have already started the few self-designed and self-financed soft skill development courses and proposes few more, along with other degree courses to fulfil its commitment to achieve the goals and objectives reflecting its vision and mission.

The courses offered by the college are:

- a) Computer Fundamentals& Internet Applications for Office Management
- b) Communication skills in English

Future proposals:

- a) Anchoring, Reporting, and News Reading
- b) Still and Video Photography
- c) Entrepreneurship Development
- d) Personality Development and Public Relations
- e) Destination Management in Tourism
- f) Cutting-Tailoring and Embroidery

These courses have been designed to create awareness among the students about various job options and encourage them to avail the benefits of various available entrepreneurial opportunities with the aim of becoming not only the job seekers but the job providers.

Apart from these the college is a **Regular Study Centre of IGNOU**, which offers a number of Certificate, Diploma, Post-graduate Diploma

Courses along with a wide range of Masters Courses for the students.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning/dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

As per the statute of University of Calcutta, there is no provision for pursuing twinning degree programmes, and therefore, the college does not offer any such programme. The College at its own level also does not offer dual degree courses for the students.

However the college has the IGNOU Study Centre since 2009 from where a student can pursue IGNOU certificate courses along with her CU degree course at the same time. The College also offers some self-designed and self-financed Certificate courses according to its vision and mission, to make the students competent in the job market, and also to become entrepreneurs.

1.2.3 Give details on the various institutional provisions with reference to academic flexibility and how it has been helpful to students in terms of skills development, academic mobility, progression to higher studies and improved potential for employability.

Range of Core / Elective options offered by the University and those opted by the college –

Since the college is affiliated to University of Calcutta, it follows the curriculum designed by the university. However the college offers diverse options of Humanities and Science subjects.

The students pursuing 3-year (1+1+1) Honours Degree course have the option to choose from a list of 14 subjects, including Tourism and Travel Management (B.A. Major).

Students choose two elective subjects from the vide from a wide range of subjects combining even Humanities with Science subjects as per their choice, taking not more than one subject from one group. The students of Arts and Humanities have diverse options in Languages, Social Sciences, Economics, Mathematics and a wide variety of practical subjects.

The students pursuing 3year General Degree Course has also the option of choosing from a wide variety of subject combinations offered to them. A student is required to choose 3 elective subjects from the following combinations, taking not more than one subject from each group.

The college further offers an array of college sponsored Add on Courses in various skill oriented subjects. These courses add on their skills and increase their potential for employability

Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options -

There is no scope for Choice based Credit system following the Calcutta University curriculum.

Courses offered in modular form -

At the Under Graduate Level the University has introduced annual evaluation and has restructured the syllabi of the subjects offered in modular form.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility -

There is no scope for Credit transfer in the University guideline. However if a student fails to qualify in any subject, then she needs to reappear only in those subjects.

<u>Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes</u> and courses-

Lateral mobility: Students have the facility to change their elective subjects even after admission within a stipulated period of time as specified by University with due permission of Principal.

Vertical Mobility: As the college offers only undergraduate courses there is not much scope for vertical mobility. However, the College offers various certificate courses to develop the skills of students either for progression to higher studies or improvement of potential for employability. Students from all streams can opt for these Soft skill Courses being offered in the institution. Further the college is a Regular Study Centre of IGNOU which offers 10 (ten) Masters Courses, which the students can pursue after their graduation.

Time Frame Mobility

Students unable to complete an academic programme due to various reasons, viz, financial constraints, medical emergencies or adverse family circumstances can resume their course within the stipulated period of time provided by the University in case they are able to justify this gap. This time frame mobility facilitates the students' progress to higher studies.

Enrichment Courses -

Keeping in mind the need of the hour, the College wants to enrich as many students as possible with proficiency in Spoken English and Basic IT related skills with knowledge of front and back office operations. This will definitely help them in gaining professional confidence for external world as well as educating and empowering the next generation.

The College wants to provide further support for the preparation of competitive examinations with the help of Government and Non-Government agencies.

Yes, the College offers Self-Financed Programme in **Tourism and Travel Management**, as per the Calcutta University curriculum.

A candidate who secures a minimum of 45% (40% for candidates belonging to SC/ST community) marks in the aggregate at the (10+2) level examination shall be eligible for admission to the B.A. (Major) Degree Course of Study in Tourism & Travel Management, provided she has passed in English having full marks not being less than 100.

Curriculum:

The curriculum for Tourism & Travel Management, being a joboriented vocational course, is different from that of other regular subjects taught in the college. The major highlights are:

- Hotel Survey

Fee Structure:

The students can study the B.A.(Major) Degree Course in Tourism & Travel Management at a monthly tuition fee of Rs. 350/-.

Teacher Qualification & Salary:

The Guest Faculty of the department are experts in their own field and are remunerated as per UGC norms.

Placement Opportunity:

More than 80% of final year students of TTMV get Tourism related jobs in different Government & Non-Government sectors. A Placement Cell is there in the College to conduct Campus Interview.

The College also offers the college designed self-financed certificate courses as follows:

- Communication skills in English

Curriculum:

With respect to curriculum, some of the programmes are related to university syllabus (more practical exposure with hands-on training facilities) whereas rest of the listed programmes are focused on job orientation.

Admission, Fee Structure, Teacher Qualification, Salary:

With respect to admission, all willing students of the college can enrol in these programs free of cost, while students from outside the College are also allowed to get absorbed in these courses if they found eligible at nominal fees.

All these courses are coordinated by the College Service Commission appointed full-time faculty of the College. They, along with their respective team members decide upon the Fee Structure, Teacher Qualification, Salary etc. are based on the survey of the existing market scenario and various internal parameters of the College.



1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

Being an under-graduate college, the institute does not have much scope in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the affiliating University. However the college has introduced a feedback system from amongst the stakeholders about the academic programmes. 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

During the last four years no new programmes/courses have been introduced.

- After first cycle of accreditation 5 (five new courses were introduced *Botany (Honours); Sociology (Honours); Chemistry (General); Film Studies (General) and Statistics (General).* As no full-time teaching post was sanctioned for these courses, the college could not apply for new subjects.
- Keeping in view the students' demand (based on feedback) the college is applying for affiliation of 5 new subjects from the next academic year- Chemistry (Honours); Mathematics (Honours); Zoology (General); Microbiology (General) and Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA).
- The college on its own has introduced and successfully running 2(Two) Soft-Skill courses.
- The IGNOU Study Centre of the college, introduced in 2009 offers 9 Masters Courses, 4 Post-graduate Diploma courses, 1Diploma Course, 1 Certificate course and 1 Under-graduate course.
- The introduction of these programmes has enabled the students to pursue the certificate course along with their undergraduate degree as also have the option of pursuing higher education right after their undergraduate degree.

- ♦ Word of Mouth: Favourable opinion regarding the College by word of mouth also ensures the required publicity.
- ♦ **Distribution of Prospectus:** The College publishes prospectus at the beginning of every academic year. The prospectus contains rules and regulations laid down by the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal, affiliating University of Calcutta, and College. The procedure of selection, fee structure, courses offered, reservation criteria and other related information about the particular course find a place in the prospectus. The prospectus provides an insight to the students regarding faculty, facilities, and activities of the College along with a detailed Academic Calendar.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes, we have a review system in place. The review process relates to both the up-gradation of the online admission system and also to the structuring of the admission criteria.

Review of Admission process:

• The Core committee in charge of admission, in consultation with the Head of the Departments and the office, annually reviews the entire admission process.

The Admission Committee on the basis of the directives of the Government and the University decides on the following:

- Admission rules and schedules
- Criteria for Admission
- Merit List preparation
- Emergent areas of concern in the admission process and their solutions
- Scope of improvement in the admission process
- Admission is on merit at the qualifying examinations (10+2 exam)
- Each year the admission norms are upgraded in consonance with Government and University directives.
- Each year the student demand for each subject/course in relation to the University approved intake capacity is reviewed.
- The departments, in whose case intake capacity is not fully realized, are motivated to give more intense and sustained effort to popularize their subject. On the other hand, where demand is more, appeal is made to the University for increase of intake capacity.
- Annually the fee structure of the college is reviewed on the basis of the feedback from the different stakeholders and if necessary accordingly revised.

The outcome of reviewing the admission process and student profile annually has been very encouraging in attracting students from all sections of the society.

Economically Weaker Sections:

- The college caters to the academic needs of students belonging to economically weaker sections of the society.



2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The college caters to the needs of the differently abled students.

- The college allows the differently-abled students to take admission in the courses of their choice. These students are motivated at every stage in this institution.
- 3% reservation in all category is maintained as per Govt. norms.
- Infrastructural facilities in the form of ramp, lift etc. are available.
- The faculty, library staff and office staff, are all well aware and sensitized to the needs of differently-abled students.
- The students having functional and vision disability are provided with writers and extra time during examinations.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The college is aware of the needs of the students and makes its assessment on the basis of the marks obtained at the previous qualifying examination.

- Before the final admission of a student in first year class, assessment of the students' need in terms of academic knowledge and skill regarding their choice of subjects is done through a verbal counselling session by the Admission Committee.
- Before University registration of the first year students, we encourage them to go for change of subject, if necessary, so that they can make a correct choice depending on their aptitude.
- The Principal through personal interview assesses the knowledge, skill and aptitude of the students applying for the Tourism and Travel Management Course.
- During admission a "Help Desk" is arranged by the Admission Committee to address the needs of the applicants and also to answer their queries. Many of the applicants coming to this institution are first generation learners, and are not conversant with the On-line admission procedure. The Help-Desk gives total support in the on-line filling up and submission of admission forms.

<u>Future Plan:</u> The College plans to introduce an option of student profile mapping in the college website whereby, the students can test their aptitude, knowledge and skill before applying for admission to a particular stream.

Before admission procedure starts, seminars will be organized inviting the students – teachers of the

neighborhood schools to create awareness concerning courses, its prospects and motivate them to join the college.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

At the beginning of the session, the teachers identify the slow learners and also the advanced learners through several interactions. Several measures are adopted to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students. These are:

- **Bridge courses:** Tutorial classes are arranged for the students. Teachers orient the students for advanced learning through the tutorial classes, where individual care is also given.
- Remedial courses: The College has a UGC sponsored Remedial course for the students belonging to the Minority and Backward classes and non-creamy layer of the society. Beyond this the college also organizes Remedial classes for the academically weak students.
- Add-on and Enrichment programmes: The College has started two college sponsored career-oriented courses. These are:
- a) Computer Fundamentals& Internet Applications for Office Management
- b) Communication skills in English

These courses are designed to inculcate ICT knowledge among the students and enhance their employability in workplace.

- Apart from these, peer learning is encouraged in a sense that meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners.
- The teachers provide special help to students involved in active sports, N.C.C. cadets and the students participating in extracurricular activities.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college takes initiatives to sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc. by taking the following measures:

Gender:

- The Institution being a Women's College, sensitizes its staff and students on gender issues by organizing lectures and seminars on women empowerment.
- Co-curricular Activities like Essay writing competitions, Debates, Extempore etc. are organized regularly to bring up contemporary women issues and infuse opinion-making skills in the students.
- Women Health is given due attention by organising various events like Yoga camps, Free Health Checkup camps and

Lectures by expert doctors on prevention of various diseases.

• The NSS Wing of the college sensitizes staff and students on various gender related socio-cultural issues.

Inclusion:

- The College follows the policy of inclusion, where there is no discrimination made on the basis of religion, caste, ethnicity, region, language, socio-economic status etc.
- The College being a Government aided one follows the 22% SC, 6% ST, 17% OBC and 3% PWD reservation policy.

Environment:

- The "Go Green" Nature Club of the college sensitizes staff and students on environment issues by organizing lectures and seminars.
- Various activities, such as, Poster Making, Awareness Advertisements, Skits, campaigns etc. on environmental issues are conducted by the NSS unit of the college.
- Awareness campaigns on "Save Ganga", Use of plastic bags etc. are organized to sensitize students as also the neighborhood through outreach programmes.
- College offers Environmental Studies (ENVS) as part of the curriculum for the students which is a compulsory subject.
- The College has installed Photo-Voltaic Solar Plant our humble effort in green energy project.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The College identifies special educational/learning needs of advanced learners through direct interaction with them, results of tests/examinations and on the basis of feedback of the teacher concerned. The College responds to their special educational/learning needs by taking the following measures:

- Special books of more advanced level are recommended to them and they are encouraged to study extra reference books and study material to enhance their knowledge
- Library facilities are allowed to them and are encouraged to use e-book facilities. They have access to Open Book Resource through INFLIBNET.
- Each department has a supporting Seminar Library for average as well as advanced learners.
- The College has institutional membership of the American Library, which the students can use.
- The advanced learners can also avail the library facility of Jadavpur University, Calcutta University Central Library etc.
- Students securing top ranks in the college/university examinations are given incentives in the form of medals, cups, book prizes, certificates etc. at the Annual Prize Distribution Function.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The College collects data and information on the academic performance of the students at risk of drop out from direct interaction with them and results of class tests, Mid-Term tests and Test Examinations.

Such data is used to make strategies to improve the academic performance of the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections and the College strives to minimize their dropout rate through the Counselling of parents and the student.

- Regular track of their attendance is kept to identify the dropout cases.
- Shortage of attendance is regularly reported in the office and timely action is taken through individual counselling.
- Parents /Guardians are given intimation about the results and shortage of attendance percentage of their wards and they are requested to meet the concerned faculty who suggest methods of improvisation.
- Feedback from the parents is given due importance.
- In case the students at risk are economically weak, financial aids in the form of tuition fee waiver and books are provided to them and are encouraged to continue their studies.
- Lectures are often delivered in both English and Bengali so as to enable students having studied in vernacular medium face no problem in comprehending.
- Remedial classes are organized for the slow learners.
- Faculty being aware of the needs of the physically challenged students, takes extra care of them.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.

The planning of teaching, learning and evaluation Schedules is done in the beginning of the session. The Principal in consultation with the IQAC and Academic Sub-Committee meets to discuss the schedule and a blueprint of the same is prepared.

Teaching / Learning Plan:

• As the college is affiliated to the University of Calcutta, it

has to adhere to the basic academic calendar issued by the university. The calendar notifies the admission dates, examination schedule and schedule of holidays.

- On the basis of this the college prepares its detailed the Academic Calendar every year and it is circulated among the teaching staff and the students.
- Term-wise modules of the syllabus are prepared in a departmental meeting at the beginning of each academic session which is published along with the prospectus and distributed to students.
- Course allocation is made amongst the teachers within the department and classes are allocated to the faculty members as per their areas of expertise and workload.
- The Routine committee prepares the timetable.
- Syllabus for the current academic year is available from the university website and demand for books is given to the librarian.
- Teachers prepare their teaching plan keeping in mind abilities and learning needs of their students.
- The implementation of this teaching plan is ensured and departmental meetings with IQAC are held regularly to monitor the progress of the departments.

Evaluation Schedule:

The students are evaluated through different forms of examination. The process of evaluation is as follows:

- Class Test The class tests are held regularly to ensure continuous assessment.
- Mid-term Test These are comprehensive tests held in the second half of the month of November on substantial portion of the syllabus to help the students to prepare for their Selection Tests.
- Selection Tests These are the terminal Tests at the end of each year of study to determine the eligibility for University Examination.
- Apart from written examinations, the students are also assessed by other inter and intra departmental activities.
- Announcement regarding examinations, methods of examinations and other general information is given in classes.
- Checked answer scripts of mid-term and selection-test are distributed back to the students for their perusal. This helps them to identify their weak points and thus are guided to produce a better performance.
- Re-exam is conducted for students with valid reasons of absence.
- Students who excel academically are awarded annually in the Prize Distribution Function, before the final exam to motivate them to work harder.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching – learning process?

IQAC constantly works to improve teaching learning process by taking the following initiatives.

- IQAC emphasizes on application of quality benchmarks/parameters for the various academic and administrative activities of the College.
- It monitors implementation and continuous improvement of the curriculum of various courses.
- IQAC organizes lectures, seminars and workshops on various cross cutting issues related to quality assurance to spread awareness.
- IQAC takes initiative in modernizing and upgrading infrastructure in terms of space, equipment, laboratories, libraries etc. and organizing training for the same.
- IQAC introduces advanced ICT enabled teaching aids to facilitate the teaching learning process, thereby enhancing students' participation level.
- IQAC facilitates research activities and encourages teachers to participate in active research, paper publication, Minor Research Project, Inter-disciplinary and various other Faculty Development Programmes.
- IQAC plans to introduce new courses at the UG and PG levels.
- IQAC takes initiative to introduce new and innovative cocurricular and extracurricular and sports activities for the overall personal development of the students, especially through formation of different clubs like the Photography Club, Interactive Club, Go Green Club, Drama Club, and Adventure Club.
- IQAC takes initiative in introducing new job oriented courses, as per changing trends in education, based on the feedback from students, industry and other stakeholders. Under the initiative of IQAC courses like Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management and Communication skills in English have been introduced.
- IQAC has introduced formal feedback system from the different stakeholders with the aim of improving the overall quality of the College.
- The IQAC acts as an internal sanctioning authority of Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) guided by UGC norms

<u>Future Plan</u>: The IQAC Plans to further promote Institutional Social-Outreach Programme involving all the students so as to imbibe self-confidence, communication skill, leadership quality, social awareness in them which in turn would enhance their learning.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The college has made conscious efforts to make the learning process more student centric. Various support structures and systems are provided for the teachers to inculcate skill based learning in the students.

- Support structure in the form of spacious, well lit and ventilated classrooms with black/white boards and microphone is available.
- The teachers use teaching tools like interactive boards with Projectors in Smart Class Rooms, PowerPoint Presentations etc. to promote interactive learning.
- Lecture method of teaching is supplemented with Guest lectures, Seminars, Audio and Video Aids etc. to make the interactive teaching process more interesting.
- In practical oriented courses due emphasis is given to practical training along with theory portion. Students of professional/vocational courses are given hands on training and they attend workshops. Students undertake internship as per the requirement of their course.
- Students participate in Debate, Extempore, Exhibitions, and Fairs to help inculcate in them innovative skills.
- Various clubs conduct activities to develop the spirit of collaborative efforts towards contemporary issues.
- Besides regular curriculum delivery, many co-curricular activities are organized in the College so that students have plenty of opportunity to have interactive learning.
- Educational tours are also arranged for students to have interactive learning in practical situations.
- Independent learning is encouraged among students by introducing self-assignments, Micro-teaching, regular library use, use of e-books and e-journals etc.
- Group Discussions are organized and peer groups are formed in each class to achieve collaborative learning and also to improve the level of the weak students.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The college arranges academic discourses and extra-curricular activities to foster critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students. Efforts are made by the faculty to inculcate in them the qualities, values and skills that would last a life time.

Critical thinking:

Within the structured syllabus, the teaching methods adopted by the teachers encourages debate and dialogues. The students are encouraged to question. They are motivated to participate in inter/intra college debate, quiz competition, seminars etc., so that their communicative skills, knowledge and critical thinking are enriched.

Creativity:

The College makes concerted efforts to promote creativity among the students. The Students' Union, various Clubs, NSS conducts various competitions, exhibitions, fairs in the form of Photography competition, Wall Magazine competition, Anandamela-Annual Fete, Poster exhibition, Debate, Extempore etc. to bring out the latent talent of the students and provides exposure to them to display their creativity. They also participate in various inter/intra college competitions and Fests.

Scientific Temper:

To develop scientific temper among the students, the teachers engages them in practical sessions and workshops. Students are encouraged to enroll in the different skill training courses and make optimal use of ICT. They often prepare power-point presentations. They are encouraged to participate in debate, and brain storming sessions as a means of inculcating scientific temper in the students.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The institute promotes the optimal use of ICT with its modern tools and innovations for enhancement of its teaching learning process.

- Faculty members use various ICT facilities and technologies to make their teaching methods effective.
- The College has a smart class room equipped with modern techniques of teaching which makes teaching and learning more effective.
- Computers with internet facility are made available to all departments whenever required to facilitate the faculty to have ICT enabled teaching tools.
- The departments have well equipped laboratories with computers, latest softwares, printers and scanners.
- Access to learning is facilitated to the students through ICT training, e-learning resources through access of N-list online library facility.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced

level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

In order to expose the students to advanced level of knowledge and skills the college takes the following initiatives.

- The college organizes lectures, seminars and workshops by experts on various topics and the faculty members and students are encouraged to participate in them.
- The College encourages the teachers to attend Refresher courses, Orientation courses and other faculty development programmes from time to time.
- The college library has annual addition of books and journals on different subjects for knowledge upgradation.
- Keeping in mind the advancements in ICT, the college has included modern techniques of teaching in its teaching tools.
- Educational tours are also organised by the college every year.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

Academic Support Services:

- The College supports all the students by providing academic counselling at the time of admission. The Admission committee guides the students to make the choice of subjects/ streams as per their aptitude while the information about admission dates, eligibility conditions and other documentation are included in the prospectus and also displayed on the notice boards and college website.
- The College identifies the slow learners and accordingly organizes Remedial Classes for them.
- Students are provided with ICT training facility and are facilitated to use ICT and e-Learning material.
- Students participating in the NCC, sports and extra-curricular activities are given academic support by the faculty to compensate for the loss of their learning and special tests are conducted to facilitate them.
- Academic counseling is always provided by the teachers to all students in the department by way of providing individualistic attention inside the class rooms.

Personal Support:

- Personal counselling is provided by the faculty, as students approach them seeking guidance for their personal problems both inside and outside classrooms.
- The economically weaker students are provided with financial assistance to decrease drop-out rates.

Psycho-social support:

• To facilitate the students with professional counselling and mentoring, the different committees remain active throughout

- the year.
- The psychology department provides the students in distress with necessary support and helps them in finding a solution to their social, psychological and personal problems. It also conducts seminars and workshops on handling examination stress.

Guidance services:

- A student friendly atmosphere is maintained in the college which is conducive to better learning.
- The career counselling and placement cell provides necessary guidance to all the final year students in planning their future.
- The Principal meets the class representatives to sort out the departmental problems and provides necessary guidance.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
 - IQAC directs all departments to enhance their teachinglearning practices through innovative measures and increasing student participation.
 - The faculty makes efforts to complement the theory with practical classes giving due weightage to the practical portion of the syllabi.
 - Students are given assignments on case studies and small projects to give them a comprehensive understanding of the topics.
 - Wall Magazine, Extempore, Debate and many more competitions are organized for students to enhance their knowledge on latest issues.
 - Guest lectures by subject experts are arranged for the students and also as part of faculty enrichment programmes.
 - Students are involved in group discussions, intra- class Quiz competitions, Essay writing contests, Paper Presentation and Micro-Teaching which enriches their learning experience.
 - Students are taken out for educational tours which are effective for knowledge up-gradation.
 - The student feedback system helps in identifying the need to adopt innovative practices and thereby increase students participation in the teaching process

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

• The College Library has almost 39,577 books on all the subjects taught in the college. The stock of books has undergone considerable expansion and the exhaustive

collection adequately meets the varied requirement of all students and teachers. There is a regular annual addition of books to the stock. Newspapers, periodicals, journals and reference books are readily available. For the benefit of students with limited means there is abundant supply of text books to be used in the reading room of the library, which is accessible to all students during college hours. Great care is taken to create a quiet and tranquil atmosphere inside the room.

- The library has a good collection of story books to increase reading habit of students.
- A computerized database is maintained and books issue -return process is computerized. Each member of the library staff help users to search for their required information. The library also provides ready reference sources like encyclopedia, dictionary etc.
- Internet Connection in the Library provides opportunity for students and faculty to make use of materials and information available on different sites. It broadens the resources for their study materials.
- The College is a subscriber of NLIST; an e-resource from where the users can download scholarly articles directly from the publisher's website. The NLIST project provides access to more than 2100 e-journals and 51000 e-books. It is an initiative of Union Human Resource and Development Ministry, Govt. of India. The browsing Centre in the library facilitates the students to access e-learning content
- Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are made available to the students. Both advanced learners and slow learners can use these papers for revising their course content and get an overview of the pattern of questioning.
- Regular up-gradation of software and other ICT facilities is also ensured.
- The Library provides Photocopy facility to its readers. This enables them to get the required non-issuable reading material photocopied at very nominal rates.
- Remedial library: In addition to the Main Library, the College has a Remedial Library which is specially equipped with text and reference books for the weaker students mainly from the SC/ST/OBC (non- creamy layer) category and minority students to enable them to come up to the level necessary for pursuing higher studies and to minimize the failure and dropout rates.
- **Seminar library:** Every department has a seminar library. The Seminar Library stocks text and reference books and aims at providing easy access to books. It comprises books that the students can borrow with the permission of the departmental teachers.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and

calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college follows an Annual system for curricular activities. In the beginning of session, the syllabus is suitably divided Term-wise into Units. Preparation and arrangement for completing the syllabus within the planned time frame and calendar is done well ahead of time. However due to certain unavoidable circumstances the College at times faces challenges in completing the curriculum. These are:

- Shortage of full-time faculty. Sanctioned posts are vacant.
- Irregularity of 2nd year and 3rd year students before declaration of University Part-I and Part-II results.
- Loss of teaching days due to election process followed by change of schedule by affiliating University.

Measures taken to overcome these:

- Guest lecturers are appointed in the departments with shortage of faculty.
- Extra classes are organized to compensate for lost class-hours due to exogenous factors.
- Student counselling and if necessary guardian-call is done to ensure attendance.
- Special classes are arranged before examinations.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Quality of teaching learning is monitored and evaluated thoroughly by the College by adopting the following mechanisms:

- The Principal with the assistance of the IQAC closely monitors the academic activities of the college and collects relevant feedback from the Academic Sub-Committee.
- Departmental meetings are held to monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning.
- Regular tests are conducted in classes to identify advanced and slow learners and are then guided as per their needs. Their performance is analyzed in departmental meetings and remedial steps are taken well in time.
- Every effort is made by the teachers to finish the syllabus within stipulated the time frame.
- Attendance of the students is strictly monitored by the administration.
- Regular class tests, Mid-term tests and Selection Tests are conducted and the results analyzed to judge the performance of the students and thereby plan necessary improvements before the final exams.
- Feedback is taken from students regarding teaching quality and Self-Appraisal proformas are filled by the faculty members at the end of each session. These are then communicated to the

teachers by the IQAC to make amendments in the teaching learning process in accordance with the needs of the students.

The college being a government aided institute does not have the authority of recruitment and retention of teachers. The process of recruitment of permanent full-time faculty of the college is as follows:

- Directorate of Public Instructions, Government of West Bengal sanctions the number of posts against the net vacancy.
- Department of Backward Classes Welfare Department, Government of India decides the category (Gen or Reserved) of faculty to be recruited following the 100 point roster
- The West Bengal College Service Commission recommends the name of teacher in accordance with West Bengal College Service Commission Act
- Prior to Aug 2010, the college had the authority of recruiting part time teachers/contractual teachers (against not filled up vacant sanctioned posts that were still lying vacant) and was responsible for disbursing their remuneration from the college fund. However by an order (dated Aug 2010) of the Govt. of West Bengal all part time teachers recruited till were converted into Government approved part-time teacher/contractual teachers whose salaries were henceforth to be paid by the Government. These teachers are permanent till the age of sixty.
- The college however has the option of recruiting and appointing Guest Faculty purely on temporary basis to be paid from college fund, as per demands of class schedule in a particular year. This number is flexible term-wise and varies

from year to year.

- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.
 - To cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty, the college recruits Guest Faculty both fresher's and retired teachers.
 - Apart from these retired teachers, scholars are invited as resource persons, to deliver short term courses.
 - At times meritorious ex-students are invited to take classes.
 - Some departments conduct periodical workshops/seminars to upgrade the process of teaching —learning.

Faculty Training programmes organized by the institution to empower and enable the use of various tools and technology for improved teaching-learning

- Teaching learning methods/approaches- emphasis is given on participation in Orientation and Refresher Courses to enhance innovative teaching skills of a teacher. These courses are developed and conducted by Academic Staff Colleges of various Universities. For example a faculty member participated in UGC sponsored workshop on Capacity building of Woman Managers in Higher Education.
- Selection, development and use of enrichment materials Training programmes are organized on use of Interactive

- Boards, ICT enabled equipment, preparing Power-point Presentations, projectors etc.
- Assessment The impact of faculty enrichment is directly felt in improved teaching and is monitored by the Principal along with IQAC.
- **Cross cutting issues** Seminars are organized on various cross-cutting issues to increase awareness.
- Audio Visual Aids/multimedia —The faculty members participate in computer literacy programmes at different stages which directly impacts on class presentation through audiovisual medium.
- OER's (Open Educational Resources) Teachers frequently make use of Internet Applications to work on various search engines to deliver efficient learning. E-Learning resources are made available to the learners. Teachers and students are encouraged to access information from INFLIBNET and web resources.
- Teaching learning material development, selection and use Some faculty members in their own capacities are authors of different books, research publications, while some as resource persons in refresher courses, developed content as per their competence.

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

The College administration has systems in place to recharge teachers. In keeping with the times the College believes in creating a research culture in the institution and strives to enhance the quality development of faculty.

- College provides facility of study leave for pursuing M.Phil. and Ph.D. in various subjects. It encourages the teachers to avail the facilities under the Faculty Development Programme of UGC.
- College administration grants duty leave to the teachers to attend Refresher Courses, Orientation Courses organized by various universities and Academic Staff College and training workshops, seminars, conferences organized by National and International Bodies.
- Adjustments are made in their time table and they are also exempted from other extension activities of the college.
- Different departments organize UGC Sponsored Seminars, guest lectures on current issues, exhibitions etc. Eminent resource persons are invited to deliver lectures.
- Faculty members are motivated to apply for minor/major research projects. They are guided to avail the grant for the same.
- Faculty members participate in discussions on TV, Radio, write articles for newspapers and write books to share their intellect with people at large.
- Teachers also attend training / Refreshers courses in connection with NSS.
- The teachers accompany the students on educational tours whereby it enhances their interaction with the students.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

None of the faculty members received any award for excellence in teaching.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

A formal feedback system has been introduced whereby the teachers

are evaluated by the students. Feedback is processed and analyzed by the Principal. The results are intimated personally to the teachers. In certain cases, necessary suggestions are given by the Principal for improvement. However there is no provision of evaluation by external peers.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The College takes multiple measures to ensure that the stakeholders of the College especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process:

- Detailed information regarding evaluation process is communicated to students at the beginning of the academic session through college Prospectus (Academic Calendar) and reminders of details of this information is given in classes from time to time.
- Announcements regarding various Examinations and other general information are regularly put up on the notice boards and notice book which is circulated in the classes.
- Meetings of the Academic Sub-Committee are convened by the Principal to inform the heads of various departments to plan the evaluation process.
- Students are shown checked answer sheets of internal examinations which makes everything clear to them regarding their performance.
- Parents/Guardians are informed about the performance of their wards.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- The system of university examination at under-graduate level for its three year degree course has changed from 2 + 1 system to 1+1+1 system from 2009 with centralized evaluation system at the end of each year in all the affiliating colleges.
- In Science subjects the syllabus has been re-formulated into 50 marks module consisting of 16 modules and 8 Papers have been introduced since 2009 and is being adopted by the college.
- The pattern of question has been re-formulated with introduction of essay type questions along with objective type of questions.
- The University has also introduced the system of supplementary examination where students who fail to pass

the main examination are given opportunity to appear for a supplementary one to clear the papers where they were unsuccessful.

- The evaluation of practical examination is conducted through laboratory experiments, project works, field reports, computer based work, instrumental survey techniques and RS & GIS software operations and viva voce. (The last one is applicable for Geography).
- The College on its own conducts different exams in line of the University exams which helps the students prepare themselves for the final examinations.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The College ensures effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the college on its own.

- The IQAC along with the Examination Committee works efficiently under the guidance of the Principal to implement the eligibility rules, examination schedule and other instructions issued by the university.
- The Faculty members perform duties as Officer-Incharge, Invigilators, Paper-Setters, Moderators, Examiners, Coordinators, Scrutineers etc. according to the duties allotted to them.
- The college is made the Zonal Centre for evaluation of some of the University answer scripts.
- The examination committee prepares its calendar for conducting the college examinations like mid-term exams and selection tests, prepares the date sheet and ensures smooth conduct of these exams by allocating duties to the faculty. Question papers for these exams are also set on university pattern and are printed in the college.
- The examination committee further ensures that the award lists are submitted in time.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Students' achievements on academic front are measured through both formative and summative evaluation approaches.

Formative Evaluation approach: Formative approach involves measuring the students' learning through verbal skills, group discussions, micro-teaching etc. College has its own process of internal assessment system through class tests, mid-term tests and selection tests. On the basis of the results the students are then advised and counselled to rectify their shortcomings. Remedial

classes are arranged for the academically weak students to help them overcome their drawbacks and prepares them to do better in their university examinations. The marks of the Mid-term tests are added to the Selection tests for determining the eligibility for the University exams.

Summative Evaluation approach: The University Part-I, Part-II and Part-III examinations are the final summative assessment. The results of the summative assessment are analyzed in the meetings so that remedial steps can be taken. The students are counselled for performing better in the next exam. The passed out students move on to higher education or appear in competitive examinations conducted by various agencies at district, state and national level. The system of assessment and evaluation adopted by us has had positive impacts.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

The college all along maintains its own system of internal assessment with transparency. Internal assessment tests are conducted on a common schedule for all the students under strict invigilation ruling out any malpractices. Secrecy of the question paper is also ensured. The results of internal assessment tests are displayed in the notice boards, so that students can know their standing. Evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students to make them aware of their mistakes. Grievances, if any, regarding the award of marks in the internal assessment can be lodged with the department and to the college through grievance Redressal Cell.

The parameters such as academic performance, class attendance, participation in co-curricular activities, behavioural aspect, independent learning, communication skills etc. are all given due weightage by the teachers and anyone lacking are counseled by them. To encourage communication skills and independent learning students are encouraged to participate in seminars, public debates, extempore.

2.5.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The College endeavours to mould its students into empowered women through value-based and quality education. The attributes it tries to inculcate in the students is academic excellence, research aptitude leadership expertise, communication skill, along with confidence, self-reliance, cultural consciousness, social responsibility and global competence.

The stated mission and vision of the College addresses these attributes and all the activities of the departments and the College are

designed with this aim.

2.5.7 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

Evaluation Grievance Redressal Mechanism at the College level: The College ensures full transparency in the process of evaluation. Marked Answer sheets are shown to the students so that they can analyze their mistakes. If students have any complaints regarding the evaluation method, discrepancy in totaling of marks, unmarked questions, there is provision for redressal.

Evaluation Grievance Redressal Mechanism at the University level: At the university level also if the students are not satisfied with their score they can apply for re-evaluation of their answer sheets within 30 days of the declaration of the final results. There is also provision for getting a photocopy of their final examination answer scripts through RTI.

The University also has the provision of supplementary examination for the candidate who missed their papers due to some emergencies or did not qualify.

2.6. Student performance and Learning Outcomes

Yes, the college has clearly stated learning outcomes mentioned in Vision, Mission and Objectives statement of the college. The College aims to orient the young students towards academic excellence, personality development and social commitment. The students and staff are made aware of these by:

- Resources like College Prospectus, College Magazine –
 "Suparna", College website, Educational exhibitions, Annual
 Social and Alumni meet.
- In the Orientation Programme for fresher's, the students are made aware of the prospects of higher education.
- The Career Counselling and Placement Cell which conducts workshops in collaboration with different Organizations so that students and staff are made aware of performance and learning outcomes.
- 2.6.2 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns

of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.

(a) Mode of Monitoring and Communication of Performance and Progress of Students: The College monitors the progress and performance of students on the basis of the results obtained in the different examinations. The results of both the college and University examinations are displayed on the notice board. On the basis of the results, the students are then advised and counselled to rectify their shortcomings. Remedial classes are arranged for the academically weak students to help them overcome their drawbacks and prepares them to do better in their university examinations. Whenever necessary, Guardians are also asked to meet the Principal and the concerned teachers personally. Students are encouraged to excel academically and in extracurricular activities with incentives like medals, certificates, book prizes etc. at Annual Prize Distribution Function.

During the last two years the pass percentage of B.A.General has gone down. Principal and IQAC have taken up the issue with the Academic Sub-committee and the Departments. Efforts are being made to improve it through more emphasis on regular internal assessment.

Various strategies are planned to achieve the intended learning outcomes:

- Through organizing UGC sponsored National and State Level workshops /seminars/ Lecture programmes the students are constantly appraised of the latest opportunities of Higher Education, research and professional opportunities in each individual subject.
- The Career Counselling and Placement Cell which conducts workshops in collaboration with different Organizations so that students and staff are made aware of performance and learning outcomes.
- Courses like *Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications* for Office Management and Communication skills in English are designed to inculcate ICT knowledge among the students and enhance their employability in the workplace.
- Apart from these, peer learning is encouraged in a sense that meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners.
- The teachers provide special help to students involved in active sports, N.C.C. cadets and the students participating in extracurricular activities.
- Internet and INFLIBNET connections in the library also provide opportunity for students and faculty to make use of materials and information available on different sites. It supplements the resources for their study materials.
- The students are motivated to participate in various social outreach programmes so as to inculcate in them self-reliance, confidence, responsibility, humane qualities, leadership and fellow feeling.
- 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

All the programmes offered in this College equip the students to either pursue higher education, undertake quality jobs to materialize their career ambitions or work for the society at large.

• The College offers job-oriented courses like Journalism and Mass Communication, Tourism and Travel Management

- which prepares the students for the global world.
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college organizes workshops inviting organizations' to prepare the students for competitive examinations.
- The cell provides information on recruitment processes, higher education institutions, interview techniques, group discussion strategies and quality jobs.
- Students are provided with career magazines in the library which enable them to cope with the current trends in the job market.
- The active participation of students in seminars is encouraged to develop their research aptitude.
- The College has started soft-skill courses like *Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management* and *Communication skills in English* to enhance the employability of the students in workplace.
- The college provides opportunity of enrolling into Courses on Jute Handicrafts & Jute Diversified Product (JDP) conducted by Department Of Jute And Fiber Technology, Institute of Jute Technology, University Of Calcutta and sponsored by Development Commissioner (Handicrafts) (DCH), Ministry of Textiles, Govt. of India, New Delhi under DCH-HRD Training Programme.

<u>Future Plan:</u> Efforts are on to register all the eligible students of the College with the employment bank of Government of West Bengal.

- 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?
 - Student performances and learning outcomes are collected through Student Data Base Management System, Alumni Association, and personal/departmental interactions with them.
 - IQAC and Academic Sub-Committee analyses the examination results, and departmental meetings are held to plan strategies for betterment of the students' performance.
 - The data collected on learning outcomes are reviewed by the Principal and Career Counselling and Placement Cell in consultation with IQAC.

The institution and faculty use evaluation/assessment as an indicator for monitoring student performance. The Faculty members duly motivate the students and give them personalized attention.
- Academic performance of the students is monitored and ensured through class performance, internal tests and university examination. Regularity and Punctuality are checked and the students are advised to improve by way of corrective and reformative actions.
- The exposure provided to the students through various curricular and co-curricular activities, soft-skill training programmes and social outreach programmes under NSS and NCC on a regular basis ensure that the learning outcomes are achieved in the course of the programme. These help to imbibe in them the humane qualities.
- The programmes organized by the Career Counselling and Placement Cell opens up the job horizon to the students.

Impact of Recommendations of MGC Research Wing.

- In spite of not having any recognized Research entre, the college has made a humble beginning with the formation of MGC Research wing. Members of faculty are motivated to take up research projects on various cross-cutting issues. At present 3 minor research projects are on the process of completion while 7 new MRP proposals have been submitted to UGC.
- The faculty members actively participate in national and international seminars and conferences.
- UGC sponsored 5 national seminars will be organized in the month of February, 2016 for which approval has arrived.
- A Research Journal is in the process of publication.
- During service 10 faculty members completed their Ph.D, while 2 faculty members each from the Departments of Economics, Psychology and Sanskrit, 1 faculty member each from the Department of History, Journalism and Mass Communication and Sociology are pursuing their Ph.D. work.
- The NCC and NSS units of the college undertake various community development activities thereby enriching themselves as also the college through these Institutional Social Out-reach Programmes.

To facilitate smooth progress and implementation of Research Schemes/Projects, the college provides full support to researchers in the form of:—

Autonomy to the principal investigator: Full autonomy is given to the principal investigator of the Minor Research Projects.

Timely availability or release of resources: Funds are released to

the principal Investigator as soon as the funds arrive from the UGC.

Adequate infrastructure and human resources: The College provides all form of infrastructural support to the researchers in the form of space, laboratory equipment, research journals, library access (books, CD/DVD), computer systems with multimedia facilities, Printer, Scanner, high bandwidth LAN and internet connection and online library resources for the teachers to pursue research activities in their respective Seminar Rooms. Research infrastructure is upgraded regularly with Annual Maintenance contracts.

Assistance in auditing of received funds is also provided during project submission.

Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers: Faculty pursuing research work can avail the facility of Study Leave as per Statute of University of Calcutta. They can apply for FDP leave as per UGC norms. To facilitate their Research work adjustments are made in their class allotment in the Routine/Time-Table to increase flexibility.

Support in terms of technology and information needs: All forms of ICT and Library support is provided in form of internet facility, computer- printer facility, library facility and INFLIBNET facility.

Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities: The College Office facilitates the process of auditing the received funds as per UGC guidelines and submission of the Utilization Certificate to the Eastern Regional Office of UGC.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

American Library, while the students can also access the Central library of Calcutta University and Jadavpur University.

- The students can have access to internet facility.
- Teachers are always there to help and guide the students both inside and outside class rooms.

3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?

National and Institutional Seminars, Workshops and Lectures are conducted with an aim to invite eminent personalities to the college for motivating faculty and students to imbibe and enhance their knowledge. The departments keep on inviting academicians, industry experts and researchers from reputed institutions to interact with the students. The resource persons are provided TA/DA and honorarium for visiting the college.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

The Leave Rules of the affiliating university of Calcutta does not allow Sabbatical Leave for research activities. However Faculty members who are pursuing research work are permitted to take leave as per UGC norms.

- Two of the Faculty members have been on Faculty Development Programme of UGC with a two year leave for research work.
- The College grants duty leave to members of faculty for participating and presenting papers at National and International conferences.
- The college provides help in research work in the form of flexible time table, and sharing of their work load with other faculty members of the department, internet facility and INFLIBNET facility.

Contribution:

- The active involvement in research during their leave increases the academic strength of the faculty members and it directly improves the academic quality of students in the college on their return.

There is no such significant initiative taken by the college in creating lab to land transfer of research findings.

3.2 Resource Mobilization for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research?

Apart from the UGC grants which the college receives exclusively for Books and Equipment, Seminars, and Minor Research Projects, the college has created a fund earmarked for organizing student enrichment activities named as the NAAC Fund. An amount of ₹ 4,000 - 5,000/- has been allotted on an average for each department annually from this fund. This can be spent for learning resources, expenses on inviting eminent scholars, for organizing departmental and institutional seminars / workshops as also for departmental publications. Besides, expenditures are also incurred to provide INFLIBNET and internet facility to faculty and students and for publication of Research Journals.

<u>Future Plan:</u> As per recommendation of the Governing body, budget allocation for research activities will be made available from the General Fund in the current academic year.

No, the college does not have the provision to provide seed money to the faculty for research activities. However, the faculty undertaking Minor Research Projects are sanctioned grants by the UGC and the same has been well utilized.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

Small Research projects are undertaken by students of Economics, Journalism, Sociology, and Education as part of their curriculum. All the 3rd year students undertake a project on Environmental Studies. The students of the Sanskrit department undertakes small projects beyond their curriculum. There is no provision to provide any financial support to the students for such research projects. However the college provides full support to the students doing project work through library service, INFLIBNET, printing, scanning and internet facilities and required software.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and

challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The College offers basic undergraduate degree programs and in these degree programme there is no provision for research work. However, for the inculcation of research aptitude in the students, the college takes the initiative to organize interdisciplinary lectures/seminars on relevant issues. The College is in the process of publication of its own research journal and faculty members from all departments are invited to contribute articles in this journal.

The Students have access to massive e-resource through the college library and its partnering institutions. The college has entered into collaborative facilities on institutional levels with American Library, State Central Library, Central Library of Calcutta University and Jadavpur University. - College library is fully computerized and the process is updated regularly.
- The library has a rich collection of 39,577 books. It has also subscribed to 18 journals/ magazines and 3 newspapers.
- College library has also introduced INFLIBNET facility to get information. It facilitates access to high quality e-resources to students and researchers.

- The library is equipped with computers, Internet facility, Reprography.
- College library has introduced a browsing centre with desktop computers and internet facility for students as well as faculty members.
- Various services are provided in the library namely, computerized cataloguing, special reference section, Newspapers and Journals, display material and display of notices etc.

There is no provision for any collaboration with research institutes to develop research facilities within the college. However 'MGC-Research Wing' (not a formal research body) provides constant motivation for the faculty to engage in research involving the students, whenever possible. The College provides all form of infrastructural support to the researchers in the form of space, laboratory equipment, research journals, library access (books, CD/DVD), computer systems with multimedia facilities, Printer, Scanner, high bandwidth LAN, and internet connection, online library resources for the teachers to pursue research activities in their respective Seminar Rooms. Research infrastructure is upgraded regularly with Annual Maintenance contracts. College library has also introduced INFLIBNET facility to get information. The laboratory based departments provide ample support to facilitate research based curriculum projects.

3.5 Consultancy

The college has established institute-industry interface through its employment oriented courses.

- The college runs the 3(three) year degree course (Major) in 'Tourism and Travel Management' (TTMV) whereby the department has a formal arrangement with West Bengal Tourism Development Corporation Ltd. (A Govt. of West Bengal Undertaking) to impart hands on training to the students of the Travel and Tourism Management, as per the curricula, for 6 months. A monthly stipend is paid to the students.
- The Journalism and Mass Communication department has an informal arrangement with the Media sector, both print and electronic, to have practical exposure of the concepts taught to them as per demand of the curriculum. Different experts from established Media Houses and ex-students of the college from Media sector come and share their experience and expertise with the students. The exposure thus gained have led to impressive employment statistics.
- The Economics Department students have the exposure of the banking sector through interaction with the experts from the Banking industry.
- The College has a Career Development and Placement Cell which effectively involves industry people who impart their knowledge to the students and advice regarding career path. The college has initiated a structured mechanism of career guidance and placement for the students in the current year under the Officials of Employment Bank, Government of West Bengal which will improve the institute-industry interface.

- 3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)
- 3.6.1 How does the institution promote institutionneighbourhood- community network and student engagement, contributing to good citizenship, service orientation and holistic development of students?

Students take part voluntarily and actively in the institutionneighbourhood-community network by participating in the Extension activities promoted by the College through its NSS and NCC units. National Service Scheme, popularly known as NSS is an extension dimension to the higher education system to orient the student youth to community service while they are studying in educational institutions, under the aegis of Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Govt. of India. National Service Scheme (NSS) has been envisaged to accomplish the goal of involving the youth in nation building activities. In 1973 Calcutta University introduced NSS in its different colleges. The NSS unit of our college started functioning from April, 2003 under the able guidance of our former Programme Officer, Dr. Malyasri Bhattacharya who set up the first unit of this college. Then it flourished over the years due to the great effort and supervision provided by the next Programme Officer, Dr. Anita Chattopadhyay Gupta. The second NSS unit of this college has been sanctioned in 2015 which is another feather in the cap of the NSS family of the college. At present the Units are supervised by Prof. Chhanda Mondal and Dr. Minati saha. The aims and objectives of NSS are (i) To understand the community in which they work, (ii) To understand themselves in relation to their community. (iii) To identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving process, (iv) To develop among themselves a sense of social and

civic responsibility. (v) To utilize their knowledge in finding practical solution to individual and community problems, (vi) To develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities. (vii) To gain skills in mobilizing community participation, (viii) To acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitude. (ix) To develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters, and (x) To practice national integration and social harmony.

Every year our student volunteers conduct 'Socio-economic Survey on Health and environment' at Harijan Basti, Keyatala our adopted slum to develop awareness on communicable disease and its prevention. Some environmental issues, mother & child health etc. among slum dwellers is our main objectives.

National Cadet Corps, popularly known as NCC is an extension dimension to the education system to orient the student youth to community service while they are studying in educational institutions, under the aegis of Ministry of Defense, Govt. of India. The motto of NCC is 'Unity & Discipline' which was adopted on 23 Dec 1957. The NCC unit of college began in 1963. Living up to its motto, the NCC strives to be and is one of the greatest cohesive forces of the college, bringing together the youth hailing from different parts of the State and moulding them into united, secular and disciplined citizens of the nation. The NCC aims at developing character, comradeship, discipline, secular outlook, the spirit of adventure and ideals of selfless service amongst young citizens. Further, it aims at creating a pool of organized, trained and motivated youth with leadership qualities in all walks of life, who will serve the Nation regardless of which career they choose. Under the able leadership of Captain Kaveri Roy, Associate NCC Officer, (ANO), 160 students enroll every year.



3.6.2 What is the Institutional mechanism to track students' involvement in various social movements / activities which promote citizenship roles?

The College extends all possible support to the students to involve

them in social movements that promote citizenship roles. The importance of community service is projected through the mission of the College which is to impart holistic education and empowerment of women who can become effective members of the civil society. The college has deputed senior faculty members for the community network and to convince and attract students to get involved in various social movements/activities which promote citizenship roles. At the time of admission, students are motivated to join various extension activities like NCC and NSS. Before enrolment, motivational lectures are arranged to motivate maximum number of students to join these activities. The NSS and the NCC unit of the College work towards promoting citizenship roles in students. The staff advisor and the coordinator of the respective units track the involvement of the students. The students, who actively participate in these extension activities throughout the year are awarded certificates and medals at the Annual Prize Distribution Function so as to encourage other students to come forward and participate in community network movements. The College thus inculcates the ideal of good citizenship in the minds of the students ensuring their active involvement in different aspects of the society.

3.6.3 How does the institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution?

Feedback from stakeholders is of great importance for the college to judge its overall performance and quality. The college always solicits the participation of all stakeholders' viz. students, parents, alumni and faculty members to gain perception of the overall performance and quality of the institution. The feedback received from them on different programmes is analyzed by the IQAC, which helps to assess2/ performance and quality.

Students: The students' Union, is a body of students who are nominated/elected as representative. They interact with the students regarding their needs/grievances/opinions and reports the same to the teachers. Suggestions given by the students through the Grievance Redressal box are properly attended and action is taken as per requirement.

Students have the freedom to approach the Principal directly through the nominated class representatives.

Parents: Parents are well informed about the performance and attendance of their daughters through the Parent-Teacher meetings. All necessary and suitable measures are adopted for improving of performance of students.

Parents are cordially invited to the college during Parents' Day and Annual Social. They are encouraged to associate themselves with the development and social activities of the college. Suggestions from parents for improvement are welcomed. They are allowed to meet the Principal and subject teachers.

Staff/Faculty: Regular staff meetings are conducted to discuss important issues regarding academic / administrative/ cultural / sports

etc. Decisions are taken after having discussions in various forums. This ensures a cordial working environment. All the staff/faculty members are open to suggestions and ready to improve.

Alumni: Healthy and informal relations are maintained with the members of Alumni Association. They visit the college and extend their help, support and cooperation. They organize programmes for enrichment of students. Their suggestions for further improvement are always welcomed.

Industry: Feedback about the industry response and requirement in the job world is collected from the participating concerns in various career counselling programmes. These feedbacks help to judge the nature of demand in the market and accordingly plan the action to improve the performance of the college,

The Principal and the Governing Body always welcome the suggestions put forward and try to incorporate the suggestions provided by the stakeholders for betterment of its overall performance and quality.

3.6.4 How does the institution plan and organize its extension and outreach programmes? Providing the budgetary details for last four years, list the major extension and outreach programmes and their impact on the overall development of students.

The Institution plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes primarily through the NSS and NCC Unit of the College. For every academic year the schedule of extension and outreach programmes is planned and executed by the in-charges of the different cells. The NSS units receive grants from the University. The grants for NCC unit comes from the Ministry of Defense in form of stipend to the enrolled students. The NCC camp expenditures are reimbursed by the NCC State Head Quarters. The expenditure for the extension activities is thus borne by the Units own fund but the expenditure over and above is reimbursed by college. In the current financial year the college has thought of creating a fund and making a budgetary provision for promoting these activities. 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/International agencies?

The importance of participation in extension services is projected through the mission of the College which is to impart holistic education and empowerment of women so that they can become effective members of the civil society. At the time of admission, students are motivated to join various extension activities like NCC and NSS. Before enrollment, motivational lectures are arranged so as to motivate maximum number of students to join these activities. The information regarding all extension activities is disseminated through prospectus so as to facilitate students in their choice of activity. Various information about future prospects of NSS and NCC are given so as to create interest among them.

NSS: Membership forms are distributed for joining NSS. Senior student volunteers describe their experiences and usefulness of NSS to inspire the new members. Regular seminars were organized on 'Society and Social Work: Relevance of NSS' where volunteers come to know about the rules and duties of NSS service and the need to develop social consciousness along with motivating them to take social service into the wider horizon of life.

NCC: The college offers its students the opportunity to join NCC. Proper enrollment is done in NCC units. Captain Kaberi Roy is in charge of the College NCC unit. The students are informed about the benefits that: NCC trained students are prioritized in Central and State employment schemes; NCC certificates help the students to find to find placement in the Armed Forces and related services; adventure training is provided to the NCC students; they receive scholarships for the best cadets; NCC students are provided their uniform free of cost and are given various allowances during their training period and NCC students have the facility of opening zero balance account in nationalized banks. The college fully supports the cadets who go for camps.

The Coordinators of the NSS and NCC units are encouraged to attend Seminars /Refresher /Orientation /Training Courses /Conferences and Workshops. College administration grants duty leave to the participants in these activities. This encourages them to participate enthusiastically in extension activities.

The achievements of faculty and students are acclaimed and highlighted in the college magazine and during Annual Social thus promoting their participation. Special incentives in form of prizes are given to the outstanding performers.

3.6.6 Give details on social surveys, research or extension work (if any) undertaken by the college to ensure social justice and empower students from under-privileged and vulnerable sections of society?

The college takes sincere initiatives to support students of ST, SC, and Minorities and OBC Sections of the society. Government schemes introduced in form of scholarships and seat reservation in higher education for the upliftment of under privileged communities, are sincerely implemented by the college. Students belonging to lower income group are given liberal fee concessions and free books. The college regularly assist the government organizations in various activities like Pulse Polio Drive.

Various extension programmes and social services have been done by the NSS unit of this college, mainly based on women empowerment, harassment, consumer awareness, **AIDS** afforestation, blood donation camps, cleanliness of our environment, environment sensitization etc. Eminent resource persons spoke on the topics of 'Women empowerment: Role of NSS'; 'Injustices against Women'; 'Women Trafficking'; 'Female Adolescent Health'; 'Food adulteration, consumer protection and settlement of disputes', 'Environment Interface with Human Activity'; 'Environmental Degradation: Disasters and Remedies'; 'Environmental Law'; 'Climate Change and adaptability: Effect on health'; 'Social Service and Employment'; 'Polio Awareness'. A workshop was arranged by 'Green peace' - an NGO, where an interactive session was held where the students got information about various issues relating to the protection of environment through a slide show. Various posters on the subject was also displayed that highlighted genetic changes and nature and pattern of communicable diseases via climate change. Our volunteers celebrated 'Aranya Saptaha' by planting saplings received from forest department of Govt. of W.B saplings around the college campus. Some volunteers attended' Vivek Chetana' twice a week for the last 5 years. The said NGO takes care of street children. Our volunteers spent half an hour with these children for teaching storytelling, drawing a picture etc, on the days they visit.

NSS is now regarded as the third dimension of education as it is a programme which gives ample scope to incorporate extension activities apart from the standard two dimensions, teaching and

research. This scheme aims at personality development of the student through community services and to arouse the social conscience of the students, providing them an opportunity to work with the people. Their interaction with the common people will expose them to the realities of life and bring about a change in the social perception. It is truly a concrete attempt to make education relevant to the needs of the society. A programme was arranged where Spark grooming Centre talked about personality grooming and made a power —point presentation on developing the right attitude towards life and developing a social consciousness.

Campus cleaning and maintaining programme was organised from time to time to keep the college campus & its surroundings clean & hygienic. Volunteers maintained the garden annexed to the college campus. NSS Book Bank created by volunteers was maintained properly and books were supplied to needy students. A programme was organized where "Anwesha" - an NGO working for betterment of children with hearing impairment spoke on the awareness of youth to the needs of differently abled children. An NGO 'Sister Margaret Foundation' held an exhibition on hand made jewellery and explained the intricacies of jewellery-making in terms of vocational training as a means of self-employment. Our student volunteers participated in programmes on 'Awareness of Pulse Polio and Immunization'; 'C.U. NSS Health Awareness Camp' and participated in rally conducted with Red Ribbon Express on Health Awareness at Sealdah Station; two rallies organized by Calcutta University in collaboration with Zee News relating to Voters' Awareness Campaign for Election 2011 under the purview of Election Commission on Aapka Vote Aapka Tagat; rally organized by Narcotics Central Bureau, Govt. of India in collaboration with NSS Unit, Calcutta University in observance of 'International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking'.

Joint collaborative inter-college initiatives were undertaken with Bijoygarh Jyotish Ray College.

During the special camp in March 2015, 2014, 2013, Dr. Puspita Ranjan Bhattacharya, Principal, Vijaygarh Jyotish Roy College, Kolkata spoke on 'NSS Relevance to Society' and also was a judge of the poster-competition which was held among the student volunteers of both the colleges.

The corporation imparts hands on training to the students of the Tourism and Travel Management as per the curriculum for 6 months which benefits the students.

Other departments of the college organizes UGC and college sponsored national and international level seminars in collaborating with other institutes whereby, the students and faculty of the College have been benefitted from the expertise made available from those institutions.

Collaborative Arrangement with University:

The college has a collaborative arrangement with Indira Gandhi National Open University since 2009 with the motive to build an inclusive knowledge society through inclusive education. IGNOU has tried to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) by offering high-quality teaching through the Open and Distance Learning (ODL) mode. IGNOU has adopted a multimedia approach to instruction. The different components being: self-instructional materials, counselling sessions, both face-to-face and via teleconferencing mode and practical classes.

Contribution to the development of the institution:

The students of the college have the opportunity of enrolling into postgraduate courses under IGNOU. As many of our students come from economically challenged background, they have to enter the job world right after their graduation. These students also get the opportunity to pursue higher education till their doctorate degree. Along with their undergraduate studies the students can as well pursue certificate courses simultaneously. Some of the innovative teaching methods used here can

also be extended in the regular courses of the college for the benefit of the slow learners.

Collaborative Arrangement with Industries/Corporate Entities:

Development of the institute is directly related with its infrastructural facilities. Electricity being the most important parameter of ICT enabled teaching-learning method, research and e-governance, the college has installed 5 kWp grid connected Photovoltaic Solar Power Plant which is directly feed to the main power source of the college. The college has entered into a collaborative agreement with **CESC LIMITED**, a Company within the meaning of s.2(20) of the Companies Act, 2013 and a Distribution Licensee under Section 14 of The Electricity Act, 2003, having its Registered Office at CESC House, Chowringhee Square, Kolkata-700001. A per the agreement, CESC agrees to allow interconnection and parallel operation of the

Solar PV Source with CESC's Distribution System on specified terms and Conditions.

4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure -

Infrastructure plays a vital role in teaching learning process of any educational institution. The College considers infrastructure as the main pivot between teaching and learning. Since its establishment in 1940, Muralidhar Girls' College adopted the policy of infrastructure creation. The Governing Body of the College, through well thought futuristic approach, resolved to create physical infrastructure in a systematic and phased manner. In addition, the College strongly believes that policy of infrastructure creation must be tuned along with current age requirement.

Highlights of the policy:

- The Building Committee of the College will be responsible for construction, through maintenance, and renovation of the main building under supervision of competent persons from the University and Government. Expert opinion from external sources is also welcome.
- Floor wise construction plan, in detail, must be designed with safety measures.
- Budgetary allocation from the College fund should be there along with submission of request for Government grant for Civil and Electrical works, time to time.
- Special constructions like Ramp, Toilet, and Lift etc. must be there for the PWD (Persons with Disability), and injured.
- Canteen, Common Room (with Indoor Game facility), Gymnasium, Outdoor Game amenities should be maintained for the students.
- The College should look for a construction for Girl's Hostel for the students coming far away from Kolkata.
- Sick Room with adequate medical facilities.
- Furniture and Fixtures fit for adequate and comfortable teaching-learning process, official works, to be purchased as per requirement. Maintenance of the same to be addressed from time to time.
- ICT enabled digital infrastructure like Multimedia Computer set, High Bandwidth networking and Internet, Smart Class Rooms equipped with LCD, LED Projectors-Smartboard, Television set, Audio-Visual equipment, CCTV, Biometric machine etc. to be encouraged for improved Teaching Learning process and E-Governance.
- Proper computer software to be developed / purchased, and maintained for effective student data management system, online admission, library, accounts & pay-roll, and college website.
- To support practical sessions of laboratory based subjects, the College is committed to provide best quality laboratory facilities with up-to-date

equipment.

- Air-Conditioners to be installed, wherever necessary.
- Water purifiers to be installed floor wise for safe drinking water.
- To maintain constant supply of water the College will create and upkeep infrastructure in collaboration with the Municipal body as well as Deep-Tube-Well.
- For effective Teaching-Learning process, the College considers its General Library and all the Seminar Libraries must be adequately equipped with Text Books, Reference Books, Magazines, Journals, Newspapers and Periodicals, Massive Online E-Resources, Internet connection, Wi-Fi Zone, Digital study materials, Photocopier etc.
- Infrastructure to organize National and International Seminars and Workshops.
- Special infrastructure to run Remedial classes for Slow Learners with adequate number of books.
- Infrastructure to support Extra / Co-Curricular activities of the students.
- Keeping an eye on environmental issues, and alternate source of energy the College should promote Solar Power.
- For uninterrupted supply of electricity, the College should have provision of Generator system.
- Creation and Enhancement of infrastructure will give birth to pollution related issues. Measures to be taken for pollution control.
- Maintenance of all the above to be done on a regular basis with Annual Maintenance Contact (AMC).

- CCTV installation is there in floor corridors, entrance and backyard, office and accounts room, library and teachers' room, Principal's room for monitoring of teaching-learning process and security.
- Constant water supply.
- Bathrooms / Toilets in every floor.
- Filtered drinking water, Cooler.
- Canteen, Student Common Room, Gymnasium.
- Sick Room with regular and emergency medical check-up by Doctor.

Technology Enabled Learning Spaces-

Apart from undertaking the expansion of 4th floor for students' indoor sports facilities, gymnasium and common room, installation of Lift and renovation of the existing infrastructure, the college has upgraded the laboratories and added additional instruments and equipment in the laboratories. IT infrastructure has been augmented with the addition of computers, software, CCTV cameras, LCDs, Biometric Attendance System and improved internet connectivity. Optimum Utilization of Infrastructure

The available infrastructure is furnished with furniture and required equipment to facilitate teaching-learning and research and efforts are made for its optimal utilization. Apart from the regular college activities,

IQAC:

- Following NAAC guideline, the College Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is functioning since the year 2004. IQAC has its own room and operational infrastructure since inception, currently which is placed in the 1st floor of the College building.
- The room for IQAC has dedicated computer systems, internet connection, multipurpose printer (Scan, Print, and Photocopy), phone connection with STD facility, FAX machine, digital projector, AC machine etc.

Grievance Redressal unit and Women's Cell:

- The college has Grievance Redressal Cell, The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) and the Anti-Ragging Committee as per UGC guideline. The function of the cells is to address the complaints from the students and places to IQAC for remedial measures.

- There is provision to take Legal advice from experts, by the ICC. Seminars and Debates are organized by the Cell to spread awareness on gender based issues, gender sensitization etc.

Counselling and Career Guidance & Placement Unit:

- A well thought Career Development and Placement structure under the supervision of Career Development & Placement Cell.
- Along with internal members, prospective employers and career counselors are also inducted into the Cell as a visiting member.

- Pre-Counseling is done for the students to judge their competence level in Vocational Training, Service Sector jobs and Higher studies. The College has built collaboration with NGOs, Government agencies to train the students so that they can be fit for the job market demands.
- Soft Skill development classes (IT enabled services training and Spoken English class) are regularly held for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd year students. At the end of each training program, certificate is issued to the participating students.



- The Building Committee looks after the maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college.
- The college also uses the expertise of the architects and interior decorators for the building upkeep.
- The heads of the departments maintain property and stock register. Annual stock taking is conducted at departmental level and the report is submitted to the Principal.
- The Internal Auditor maintains the General Asset register.
- The college has appointed security guards to keep a constant vigil on the college infrastructure.
- CCTV cameras have been installed at all key positions.
- Residential facility is also provided to 2 Group-D employees to ensure safety, security and cleanliness of the campus at all hours.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/instruments?

• Annual maintenance and repair of the infrastructure and equipment is undertaken by the college in a systematic manner.

- Day to day cleaning is carried out by the staff appointed for cleaning and maintenance.
- The computers, electronic devices and other equipment are maintained and repaired through the funds available in the institution.
- Budgetary provisions are made for maintenance of both equipment and infrastructure.

The college has specified places for the sensitive equipment like electricity generators, water purifiers, chemicals and scientific instruments.

- The college has installed Electricity Meter with proper arrangements for handling voltage fluctuations.
- There is overhead water tank with submersible water pump for regular supply of water. Underground water reservoirs, roof-top water tanks, and pipes are get regularly cleaned and sanitized to avoid water contamination.
- The laboratory staff maintains the scientific instruments and Chemicals.
- There is provision of electrician for the upkeep of electrical equipments and their maintenance.
- The college has AMC with the firms for the regular and routine check-up and upkeep of the water purifiers.

This can be verified from the merit lists published by the College prior to the admissions.
- The institution takes all possible steps for curricular implementation and the teachers of the institution try to follow the schedule thoroughly. The examination and result schedules are also maintained.
- Even before admission, the students receive comprehensive information about college, its departments, faculty, and the various programmers it offers through the prospectus uploaded in our website. Having all the information at their disposal, the students can make an informed choice.


Freeships and/or fees concessions and books are provided by the College to students, who are regular in classes, having good results,



5.1.3 What percentage of students receive financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies?

- On the average, every year students who belong to SC/ST/OBC category receive backward class stipend.
- On the average, every year students who belong to Minority category receive minority class stipend
- Nanyashree Prakalpa –a state Government venture under the Department of Women Development and Social Welfare in which unmarried female students between 18-19 years, whose family income is equal to or below ₹ 1,20,000/- are given a stipend of Rupees 25,000. Primary objective of the scheme is protecting and empowering all adolescent girls; curb down the tendency of drop-out; save them from early marriage and enabling environment for elevating the education, health and nutrition status of women and children. The college uploads the applications of the eligible students.

Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker

sections:

• As per the government reservation quota, seats are reserved for SC (22%); ST (6%); OBC-A (10%); OBC-B (7%) and PWD (3% of all category) students along with marks relaxation. Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker section receives scholarships / stipend from State Government.

Students with physical disabilities

• Infrastructural facilities like the entrance ramp and the lift allow challenged students to operate wheel chairs if required. The counselling sell of the college is especially mindful of their needs, and is ready to motivate and stand by them. 3% reservation in every category is maintained as per Government norms.

Overseas student

• The college doesn't have any overseas student in the current academic year. However there is provision of admission as per University guidelines.

Students to participate in various competitions/National and International

• Students are encouraged to participate in various intra and inter college competition for which they are awarded during the annual social. The faculty readily extend their suggestion and expertise. If financial help is required, the college is ready to provide it.

Medical assistances to the students

• The college has an assigned sick room with basic amenities. First Aid is also available to tide over emergencies. We also have arrangement with a well-known medical practitioner, who visits our college on a regular basis and checks on our students. We also have basic medical equipment such as stretcher and wheelchair.

Organizing coaching classes for competitive exam

• Different organizations have been invited by the Career Counselling and Placement Cell of the College to organize coaching classes for competitive examinations. Currently we have an arrangement with RICE and Gorge Telegraph – institutions which have significant expertise in competitive examination coaching.

Skill Development

• IQAC in consultation with stake holders and approval from the Governing Body have started the few self-designed and self-financed soft skill development courses and proposes few more, along with other degree courses to fulfill its commitment to achieve the goals and objectives reflecting its vision and mission. The college offers: Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management and Communication skills in English.

In the changing global scenario, the requirements that ensure employability in the workplace have changed. A college and university degree alone is not enough for employability. The market demand, student interests and feedback from stakeholders initiated the college to design and develop the curriculum for these courses.

Support for "slow learners"

• The College has UGC sponsored Remedial course for the weaker students belonging to the Minority and Backward classes and non-creamy layer of the society. Beyond this the college too organizes Remedial classes for the academically weak students before and after college hours.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning /corporate /business house etc.

- The students who decide to pursue higher studies are regularly counselled about the universities/institutions to which they can apply. Besides, the IGNOU Regular Study Centre at the college premises offers a number of courses and is a very convenient option for our students. The Study Centre offers Masters in Psychology, Counselling and Family Therapy, English, Economics, Sociology, History, Political Science, Extension and Development Studies and Commerce. Post-graduate Diploma course is offered for Journalism and Mass Communication, Extension and Development Studies, Urban Planning and Development and Environment and sustainable Development.
- The students of some of the departments are exposed to corporate & business houses, as part of their curriculum requirements. Many of our students have done internship with business houses in the past, which has led to their employment.

Publication of student magazines

• Wall magazines and departmental journals, as also student research journals, form part of the regular student activity of the college. Developing entrepreneurial expertise is part of the Travel & Tourism Management course work. The college has, besides, a number of self-designed add-on courses, such as Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management and Communication skills in English which would allow the students to start entrepreneurial ventures on their own.

Innovations in curriculum design help the College to meet the changing requirements of the modern global scenario. The efforts made by the College to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students are:

• The Tourism and Travel Management (TTMV) department has a formal arrangement with West Bengal Tourism Development Corporation Ltd. (A Govt. of West Bengal Undertaking). The corporation imparts hands on training to the students of the

- Travel and Tourism Management for 6 months. A monthly stipend is paid to the students.
- The college provides opportunity of enrolling into Courses on Jute Handicrafts & Jute Diversified Product (JDP) conducted by Department Of Jute And Fibre Technology, Institute of Jute Technology, University Of Calcutta sponsored by Development Commissioner (Handicrafts) (DCH), Ministry of Textiles, Govt. of India, New Delhi under DCH-HRD Training Programme.
- The College has a Career Development and Placement Cell which effectively involves industry people who impart their knowledge to the students and advice regarding career path.
- IQAC in consultation with stake holders and approval from the Governing Body have started the few self-designed and selffinanced soft skill development courses and proposes few more, along with other degree courses to fulfil its commitment to achieve the goals and objectives reflecting its vision and mission. The college offers: Computer Fundamentals & Internet Applications for Office Management and Communication skills in English.

Impact: Impact of the efforts put in by the College for developing entrepreneurial skills of the learners is visible in the success story of our Tourism and Travel Management Department. Our students have been employed in both government and non-government sector. Introduction of the soft-skill courses will positively benefit the students in improving their employability. It will make the students competent to face the challenging global market

Policy of Co-Curricular Activities:

Keeping in mind the vision and mission of the college, a decision has been taken that besides teaching the curriculum the institution will impart such knowledge and skill to the students that will help them in their overall development. Here comes the importance of co-curricular activities. The college has created ample opportunities for the students, to develop their talent in the area of sports and cultural arena. At the same time they can also nurture their hobbies in such a way that in future, some of the students **may convert the hobby into viable profession.** To make them skilled in such areas the college has formed seven clubs where the students can join according to their choice. These clubs will help them not only to gain theoretical knowledge about the subjects but will provide enough scope for practice. This in turn will help them to gain a lot of confidence in practical life which again will be a support in their academic as well

job-oriented career. Along with the functions of the clubs the college provides free training of Spoken English and Basic Computer Practice to the weaker section of the students. Acquiring these soft skills will definitely be helpful in increasing their employability.

Strategies to promote participation of students in extracurricular activities, following steps are taken by the institution:

- To promote participation in sports special coaching in Table Tennis, Track and Field, Yoga, Karate, Rock Climbing and Adventure sports etc. have been introduced. Sports in-charge acts as a mentor, counsellor and guide for the students.
- To promote participation of students in extra-curricular activities like Quiz Competition, Debate, Extempore, Music and Dance, Photography, Drama, Youth Parliament etc. clubs are formed. Professional Experts are invited to give them special coaching for the preparation of items especially during Annual Social.
- Students are motivated to celebrate important days of National and International importance to get exposure to cultural consciousness.
- All departments promote extra-curricular activities. The faculty is engaged throughout the year in providing opportunities to the students to showcase and develop their hidden talents.

Additional Academic Support and flexibility in examinations:

• Students participating in different games are assured of extra classes by the teachers concerned to compensate the loss in learning process by their absence in regular classes. They are given-special guidance for their exams to compensate them for their loss due to absence from classes during their training schedule and matches. Examination schedules are made flexible for students participating in extra-curricular activities and sports activities.

Special Dietary Requirements and sports uniform and materials:

• The College provides health drinks and dietary requirements of students participating in sporting events and NCC camps. Nutritious diet is provided to the NSS volunteers during special camping activities. Refreshment and sports kit given to all players.

Career Counselling


 The career counselling and placement cell has a well-structured system in place to inform and counsell the students regarding higher studies and employment opportunities.





- College identifies the advanced learners on the basis of class interaction and Part-I examination results. These students are the prospective ones who can go for higher studies and are given the support and guidance. They are provided with additional study material and classes. Faculty members of the Institution personally counsel and encourage these meritorious students for higher level of education.
- Career Counselling Cell provides free counseling to all students to seek job opportunities. It arranges special lectures by Professional Career Councilors to get guidance

- information about Government, Semi-Government Organization, and Non-Government Organizations and also enlightens students on how to avail themselves of these opportunities.
- To improve the potential of the students for employment the College has started soft skill development and personality development courses.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- Reasons observed for drop-out are:
 - ➤ Weak economic conditions
 - ➤ Early marriage
 - > Family problem
 - ➤ Wrong choice of subject
 - ➤ Shift to courses with employment opportunities
- To bring down the dropout rate the Counselling Cell and the concerned departments interact with the students and make an effort to find out the reasons, and needful is done to address the issues. At the time of admission the college guides the students to make the choice of subjects/ streams as per their aptitude thereby reducing the probability of drop-out.
- The College provides financial help to economically weaker students so that they do not discontinue for economic reasons. If needed their parents are also contacted and counseled and efforts are made to resolve the issues.
- Special support in the form of Remedial classes are arranged for the students who are at the risk of failure. Such students are identified after the mid-term tests. The concerned teachers put in extra efforts to guide these students and motivate them. Parent teacher meetings are conducted if it is necessary.
- In many of the cases, the reason for discontinuing being marriage of girls, the college tries its best to persuade these students to continue their studies. Teachers even help them personally in this regard.
- The college also allows the casual students to appear for examinations. Any student who is a dropout or fail to continue in regular courses is allowed/persuaded to appear in examinations as a casual candidate.

5.3 Student Participation and Activities

5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

Sports and Games:

- The College has a Gymnasium, Playground and Sports Centre (with Sports Library) to promote indoor and outdoor sporting activities amongst the students and the Teaching and Non-Teaching staff. Muralidhar Girls' College organizes and participates in various Inter College competitions. The college provides Indoor Sports facilities like Table Tennis Coaching Centre, Yoga Coaching Centre, Karate Coaching Centre, Carom etc. Among Outdoor Sports facilities there is Track & Field Coaching Centre, Badminton, Kabadi, Mountaineering, Adventure Sports, and Nature Club. The college organizes Rock Climbing, Adventure Sports, and Nature Study camps within and outside West Bengal every year, in collaboration with the Indian Mountaineering Foundation (IMF).
- Annual Sports of the College is a long-standing tradition and it has been effectively fostering a spirit of healthy competition and sportsmanship. Every year the Annual Sports of the College is organized with great enthusiasm among the students with considerable number of participation. Track-and-Field events, Javelin Throw, Discus Throw, Go-As-You-Like, and various other innovative sports events are taking place every year.

Cultural and other extracurricular activities

- The **Annual Social** of the College is in many ways a culmination of the yearlong cultural and extra-curricular activities of the students. They are rewarded not only for their academic performance but also for excelling in Music, dance, Debate, extempore Speech and Elocution Competition. Other cultural activities include the Fresher's Welcome, Teacher's Day, Students' Re-union and Staff Re-union.
- The College Fest "SPARK" brings to the fore the artistic aspirations of the students and the organizational skill of the Students Union. From generating funds to the detailed management of every aspect of the event, the students, under the leadership of their Union, take on a very active role. The teachers and college administration are undoubtedly supportive, but the credit for the success of SPARK entirely goes to the students.
- **Publications**, in varied forms and shapes, form an integral part of the intellectual life of Muralidhar Girls' College. They are reflective of the budding minds of young scholars and the on-going academic pursuits of the teachers of the College. Consequently the College brings out a number of publications like the magazines and journals of the respective departments such as: SUPARNA: the College magazine, SCRIBE: the journal of the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication, INSIGNIA: the journal of the Department of English, Lekhani: Journal of

- Bengali Department
- Anandamela: Many of our students have inherent artistic talents and excel in producing original handicrafts. To encourage their creativity and bring out their entrepreneurial skill, a College fete Anandamela is held every year. The students put up various stalls, displaying their varied and interesting merchandise and they find willing clientele in the teachers of the college.
- **Seminars:** Various departments of the college arrange UGC sponsored seminars in which the students play a major organizational role. They also participate in students seminars as part of their co-curricular activities.
- The students of this college also participate in **Youth Parliament Sessions** and have won prizes.
- The NSS Unit santioned by the Government of India has been set up in this college. Social outreach programmes are held regularly. NSS is mainly a personality development programme by involving the students in community services. Special camps are also held each year where certificates issued by University to the students.
- NCC: The College offers its students the opportunity to join NCC. These trained students are prioritized in Central and State employment schemes. NCC certificates help the students to find to find placement in the Armed Forces and related services. Adventure training is provided to the NCC students.
- Photography Club: 'Zoom In' -The Photography Club of the College not only covers the topics of Photography in the university syllabus, but also put its best effort to encourage the member students and faculties, so that they can feel a sense of involvement with the intricate technicalities of Photography. It encourages members to participate in various Photography competitions. It gives logistic support to all departments of the College in number of academic and non-academic events, to build a rich repository of images and pictures for College Archive.
- Interactive Club: 'We Speak' This is a name of constant and serious effort of the College which extracts treasures of beautiful minds of our students. It provides a right platform for the students to vent their views, and exchange their experiences on various relevant issues of importance. The club organizes Elocution, Debate, and Quiz competitions in intra-college as well as inter-college level.
- Drama Club: 'Oishiki' Mentors of 'Oishiki', the drama club of the College, is in constant search of talents of theatrical performance, within our students, teachers, and also non-teaching staffs. 'Oishiki' produced a number of remarkable drama performances so far in College Annual Social, Re-union. Apart from stage performances, this club

- conducts regular workshops for the students to generate enthusiasm, involvement, and passion for drama.
- Cultural Club: 'Spandan' / Literary Club: 'Bhasa' These are the cultural wing of the College is sincerely engaged to explore and spread singing, dancing, writing, and many more cultural activities, involving the students, through-out the year. The College gives whole hearted support for the students to support extra-curricular activities through the platform 'Spandan' and 'Bhasa'.
- Nature Club: 'Go Green' This club of Muralidhar Girls' College considers care for nature as a co-curricular activity of the students. The mission of 'Go Green' is to spread awareness about the economic, cultural, scientific and aesthetic values of environment. It also provides platform to explore the nature through trekking, rock climbing, photography, which are close to nature.


In line with the above the college **believes** in **decentralization** of **leadership** so that students, teaching and non-teaching staff, alumni, parent,



- BURSAR of the college.
- Teachers' Representative in the Governing Body.
- 'In-charge of examination' and allocation of duties at the time of college and university examination.
- 'In-charge of Zonal Centre' at the time of answer script distribution, evaluation, and tabulation.

Grooming leadership at non-teaching level-

The college offers following responsibilities for the non-teaching staff:

• Non-Teaching Representative in the Governing Body.

- Head Clerk of the college office.
- Representation in different sub-committees of the college.
- Member of the Finance and Purchase committee.

The college has 13 honours departments, 1 self-financing department, 4 general departments, office comprising of general section, cash section, accounts, and cooperative for staff and students. In addition there are NCC, and NSS units.

All the above departments, sections, and units are **cohesive** (*means entrusted with a well-defined responsibility for that department / section / unit only*) in nature, and they are **coupled** (*means department / sections / units are supervised and controlled by their own management in micro level*) in a structured or modular fashion in the management of the college. After framing macro level guidelines the Governing Body delegate authority to them, under the supervision of the IQAC. In this way the institution works towards decentralized governance system.

- 1) Sustainable approach of development.





Quality improvement strategies of Teaching & Learning:

Comprehensive faculty development, which is more important today than ever before, empowers faculty members to excel as educators and to create vibrant academic communities that value teaching and learning.

- IQAC is in constant touch with changing patterns of global educational path and newer educational models. Teaching-Learning strategies of UGC are also taken into account.
- IQAC guides academic sub-committee to adopt the newer educational models in line with the strategies framed by the UGC.
- Teachers are then trained and motivated to accept the improvement strategies. If required, they are sent for suitable refresher and orientation courses.
- Professional development (new faculty members are oriented to the university and to their various faculty roles).
- Instructional development (all faculty members have access to teaching-improvement workshops, peer coaching, mentoring, and/or consultations)
- College provides training in regular intervals for teachers, so that they can utilize modern age Information and Communication Technology.
- Leadership development (academic programs depend upon effective leaders and well-designed curricula).
- Teachers and students are encouraged to exercise active learning process.
- Project works are assigned to the students and teachers are instructed to guide them in completing project related activities.
- Organizational development (empowering faculty members to excel in their roles as educators according to our quality policies and procedures that encourage and reward teaching and continual learning)
- Feedback is collected and analyzed by the IQAC.

Quality improvement strategies of Research and Development

- Budgetary provision is there to maintain and upgrade research infrastructure with ICT (provision of separate room, Laboratory). UGC and State Government grants are claimed for research work (Minor and Major research projects).
- Access to Library (book, CD/DVD, papers and journals, e-library resource like N-LIST etc.) is available.

- Participation in research and research methodology oriented Seminar, Workshop, Conference are encouraged.
- MGC-Research wing is always attentive to research and publication related issues with ISBN and ISSN.

Quality improvement strategies of Community Engagement:

- Awareness campaigns are held by NSS unit of the college to grow familiarity with the ground level facts of surrounding community. Problems of the local community are recorded (manually as well as audio-visual media) in a disciplined fashion.
- Observations from community engagement are grouped into different headings like, age group, gender, caste, religion, culture, income group, marital status etc.
- Based on the recorded facts, seminars and workshops are conducted, inviting respective Government and University officials, experts from NGOs, to address their needs and problems. Thereafter, action plans are prepared to engage the teachers and students for field visits.
- Achievements and failures of the above activities are placed to IQAC, University, and local government bodies, in a structured report.
- At the end, detail analysis is done for better performance in future.


Quality improvement strategies of Human resource management:

- Students as human resource are main driving force of the college. Transparency of admission process (honours, general, and major streams) is improved through online admission (www.muralidhargirlscollege.com) since 2013-2014 academic session. Merit list is published in college website.

- Finally, feedback from students and parents are maintained and analyzed.


Quality improvement strategies of industry interaction:






The college remains always supportive in enhancing professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff. Efforts taken by the college in this respect are:




6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources:



- The Cash section and Accounts department headed by Accountant works under the supervision of the Finance Sub-Committee and Bursar under the guidance of the Principal. The Principal reports to the Governing Body.
- Accounts department undertakes all works related to accounting including treasury and bank operations and preparation of annual draft budget of the college with consultation and supervision of Bursar and Finance Sub-Committee.
- The Draft Budget is prepared at the end of each financial yearusing standard method of budget preparation, taking into considerations the financial requirements of each departments and the general development plans designed by IQAC, Building Committee and subcommittees.
- Department / Section / Unit have to raise requisition of purchase with budget / estimate and place to the Bursar for necessary approval.
- After getting approval from the Principal the draft budget is finally submitted to the Governing Body for approval. Then the budgetary allocations are made available for implementation following relevant financial rules and regulations.

• Expenditure are of 2(two types: i) Salary related expenses and ii) Other expenses.



- Annual Budget is made for the Remuneration (Salary from College Fund, and Self-Financed Courses) and general Expenses.
- For the other expenses provision is made by the Finance Sub-Committee as per requirement in consultation with IQAC and Principal.
- Purchases are made on basis of quotations, Tender or e-tender depending on the amount.
- Work-**orders** are issued to vendors.

- The **Principal acts as Drawing and Disbursing Officer (DDO)** and receives grants and presents financial reports and **Audited Utilization Certificates** to different funding agencies such as UGC, State Government etc.
- Payments are made on the basis of the Bills submitted to the Accounts section. Bills submitted to the office of accountant for record and verification is then sent to the Bursar for verification and approval finally to Principal for approval.
- Payments are made either in the form of cheque or DD. Small payments are made in cash. **Petty Cash transaction** limits are fixed by the Finance Committee.
- The Finance and accounts operation of the college are **regularly audited** by the auditors deputed by the Director of Public Instructions, Government of West Bengal as statutory audit. <u>Audit till the financial year 2013-14 has been completed. The audit for the next financial year (2014-15) is on process.</u>
- **Asset Registers** are maintained department-wise, financial year-wise and planned expenditure-wise.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

- As internal audit process, accounts section always exercises standard auditing procedure with up-to-date file maintenance system.
- Accounting and financial records are maintained through computer software.
- Record related to Salary (COSA implemented), CAS, Leave Statement, Loans and Advances are digitally processed and maintained.
- External Audit is done annually with detail physical verification of files and assets. Auditing is performed for other funds also, time to time.
- Audit Report is submitted to the Governing Body to review major audit objections, if any, followed by instructions to comply accordingly.

Last audit was done for the financial year 2013-2014. No major audit objections are there in the audit report. Compliance report states that the audited accounts give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the college as on 31st March, 2014. (See Annexure VII for Audit Reports)







CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICE

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Environment has become the most important subject since the last three decades. Awareness about environmental issues such as ozone depletion, greenhouse effect, global warming, air pollution etc. is increasing. The college has sincerely taken up these issues. It is making dedicated efforts in spreading awareness and reducing pollution.

The college has constituted a Green Audit Committee consisting of faculty members and students which regularly undertakes various tasks such as:

- Regular counselling of students to maintain the campus clean.
- Students are encouraged to use paper and jute bags instead of polythene bags. Use of polythene bags is discouraged.
- Green Audit Committee ensures that students maintain ecofriendly environment in the college. Placards are displayed at various spots in the college regarding the same.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy conservation

- The college has well-lighted and well ventilated class rooms, hence not much tube lights are needed during teaching hours. The college building is cool because of high roofs.
- The College plans to use Energy saving CFL tubes instead of conventional bulbs and tubes.
- Class Representatives and staff take the responsibility of switching off lights and fans in the class rooms.

* Use of renewable energy

- The College installed **5Kv Solar Power Station on the college rooftop to inject Solar Energy** i.e., a **renewable source of energy**, into the main electricity supply line of the College from the Calcutta Electric Supply Corporation.
- * Water harvesting: N.A.

***** Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

 The canteen contractor is strictly instructed to use only LPG Cylinder and not coal or any other fuel which emits carbon. • Dry waste garbage is not put on fire.

* Plantation

Go Green Club owns the responsibility of plantation in the college. In-spite of non-availability of land, and extensive renovation work by PWD the college tries to maintain plants in pots.

* Hazardous waste management

- Under Swachh Bharat Abhiyan the students are made aware to keep the campus clean and throw all the waste material in the dustbins.
- The College plans to segregate the garbage collected on daily basis into biodegradable waste and non-biodegradable waste and collect them in separate bins and dispose them off in the corporation bins.

* e-waste management

Purchase of Electronic Data Processing (EDP) equipment are done through exchange offer with older machines of the College to avoid dumping of e-waste. Invalid computer systems are given to those agencies that have the infrastructure of proper e-waste management. Environment friendly EDP devices are purchased.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- 1. The College installed **5Kv Solar Power Station on the college rooftop to inject Solar Energy** i.e., a **renewable source of energy**, into the main electricity supply line of the College from the Calcutta Electric Supply Corporation.
- 2. To promote paper-less transactions the College uses Electronic Media, as much as possible. Use of college website and social media for information exchange, online admission for honours and general courses, computerization of office and library are some of the vital steps taken in this regard.
- 3. The college has many Extra / Co-Curricular activities and these are practiced regularly. The **innovative part** of this practice is that the college is giving so much importance to all these activities that they are not only treated as **Extra or Co-Curricular** subjects but are getting a new dimension **dissolved into the main curriculum**.
- 4. The college arranges many seminars and workshops which are of

'immense importance 'to subsequent departments. Our innovative practice to find out different inter-disciplinary areas from the proceedings of the seminars and workshops and submit those points to the respective departments. As a matter of fact the students go through the proceedings of the seminars and workshops meticulously and point out the areas focused and helpful to other departments. This will help not only the concerned departments but the other department also can reap the benefit from the expert analysis.

- 5. The students' activities to neighborhood extension services include research work too. Through these research projects, they gather information, analyze them and write reports on that. These reports are then submitted to the respected Municipal and Administrative bodies. There lies the innovative practice that the students not only do the research but they also submit the reports to the concerned authority so that they cannot use those information and analyzes for any developmental work.
- 6. ICT & E GOVERNANCE: The College is 75 years old and along with time the institution has stepped forward into Digital age. The administrative and day to day work of the office is done through computers. A Workstation has been installed in the Principal's room to monitor the entire function of the college. The Administrative Office, Cash and Accounts Section, General and Seminar Libraries, each Department is connected to the Principal's workstation through Computer Network (LAN) that helps the Head of the institution to get any information at one click and whenever it is necessary. High Bandwidth BSNL Internet connection, Biometric System Server and CCTV Server is also deployed in the Principal's Room. The Principal not only monitors the system but also administers it to keep the data secured.
- **7.** E-waste management: Purchase of Electronic Data Processing (EDP) equipment are done through exchange offer with older machines of the College to avoid dumping of e-waste. Invalid computer systems are given to those agencies that have the infrastructure of proper e-waste management. Environment friendly EDP devices are purchased.

NCC - Educating students through Unity and Discipline

NSS - Combined participation of students and teachers through Community Service.

Goal:

- Develop sense of unity and discipline within the students from different culture and socio-economic background and motivate them to join the Indian armed forces.
- Create a team of trained youth with leadership qualities in all aspects of life so that they can render selfless service to India irrespective of which career they decide.
- Encourage them to build Comradeship, Secular Outlook, Adventure and Sportsmanship.
- Grow the feeling towards the Community and to understand themselves in relation to the Community.
- Identify the needs & problems of the Community and involve them in problem solving process.
- Gain skill in mobilizing community participation and also to develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disaster.

The Context:

- The most challenging part while designing and implementation of NCC an NSS programmes is to groom positive and fearless mindset among the students, teachers, and parents.
- Detail planning is required for at-least 10 years to sustain rigorous action plans formulated and instructed by the Indian Army.
- Academic schedules are accordingly be adjusted for those who will join the NCC and NSS.
- The college must be extremely careful to the required number of enrolment in NCC / NSS, to retain these services.
- The College must take responsibility to keep the Students / Cadets medically fit as per NCC / NSS rules and regulations. Arrangements for medical examination of students / cadets must be done.
- Accommodation and Playground have to be provided by the College

for NCC / NSS office, storeroom, strong room, and NCC parades.

• Building connections to the Government / Municipal Bodies / NGOs are very essential.

The Practice:

NCC and NSS is now regarded as the third dimension of education which gives ample scope to incorporate extension activities apart from the standard two dimensions, teaching and research. This scheme aims at personality development of the student through community services and to arouse the social conscience of the students, providing them an opportunity to work with the people. It is truly a concrete attempt to make education relevant to the needs of the society. The importance of participation in extension services is projected through the mission of the College. At the time of admission, students are motivated to join various extension activities like NCC and NSS. Before enrollment, motivational lectures are arranged so as to motivate maximum number of students to join these activities. The information regarding all extension activities is disseminated through prospectus so as to facilitate students in their choice of activity. Various information about future prospects of NSS and NCC are given so as to create interest among them. For every academic year the schedule of extension and outreach programmes is planned and executed by the in-charges of the different cells. The college offers its students the opportunity to join NCC. Proper enrollment is done in NCC units. NSS membership forms are distributed after admission. Senior student volunteers describe their experiences and usefulness of NSS to inspire the new members. Regular seminars are organized to make the students aware about the rules and duties of NSS service. The expenditure for the extension activities is borne by the Units own fund but the expenditure over and above is reimbursed by college. In the current financial year the college has thought of creating a fund and making a budgetary provision for promoting these activities. The NSS and the NCC unit of the College work towards promoting citizenship roles in students. The in-charge of the respective units track the involvement of the students. The students, who actively participate in these extension activities throughout the year, are awarded certificates and medals at the Annual Prize Distribution Function so as to encourage other students to come forward and participate in community network movements. The College thus inculcates the ideal of good citizenship in the minds of the students ensuring their active involvement in different aspects of the society. The college fully supports the cadets who go for camps. The in-charge of the NSS and NCC units are encouraged to attend Seminars /Refresher /Orientation /Training

Courses /Conferences and Workshops. College administration grants duty leave to the participants in these activities. This encourages them to participate enthusiastically in extension activities.

- Students find it difficult to join NCC / NSS camps as **regular study and examination assignments** are there in the college as per the Calcutta University guidelines.
- NCC and NSS are not a regular curricular activity as per Calcutta University schedule. If so, that could have been easy for both the ANO (Associate NCC Officers), NSS Program Officers of the College as well as for the student / cadets to participate all NCC / NSS oriented activities.
- Fund crisis is there for the NCC Cadets, as stipend received from the Army is not sufficient for them to bear all the costs of attending camps.
- More funding is required to promote NSS activities.

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

Information and Communication Technology (ICT)



ICT - beneficial for Students, Teachers, Leadership and Governance. We create individual learning paths for them. Goal:



- Inculcating the practice of ICT in the College aims at realising the goals of the National Policy of ICT in Higher Education and the National Curriculum Framework.
- Given the dynamic nature of ICT, the practice **emphasising the core educational purposes**. The design of ICT framework in the College focuses on a broad exposure to technologies, together aimed at **enhancing creativity and imagination of the learners**.
- For the teacher, it is an initiation into exploring educational possibilities of technology, and learning to make right choices of hardware, software and ICT interactions.
- For the student, it is an initiation into creativity and problem solving, and an opportunity to shape career pursuits.
- For the College Administration and Governance, it is the practice of fast, accurate, and environment friendly sustainable approach.

The Context:

- The most challenging part while designing and implementation of ICT enabled system is to groom positive mindset among all the stakeholders of the College.
- In-depth and elaborate long term planning is required, for at-least 5 years, to sustain policies and action plans framed by the Government.
- Market and need based analysis regarding ICT oriented issues is of extreme importance.
- Academic schedules are required to be flexible to accommodate ICT practice.
- The college must be extremely careful in encouraging all stakeholders to adopt ICT oriented activities and at the same time, to adopt those. .

- The College must take responsibility to keep the Students / Teachers / Parents to be psychologically fit for adopting the practice of ICT.
- Space, Fund, Equipment, Books, and secured internet connections have to be provided by the College for the purpose of ICT enabled practices.

The Practice:

Muralidhar Girls' College is well equipped with a robust Information and Communication Technology policy which helps to adopt state of the art Technology in its teaching-learning process through e-learning as well as office and administrative practises through e-governance.

To make ICT beneficial for students we create individual learning paths for them through-

- 1) Creation of instructional tools for individualized student learning considering diversity of languages, university and state curriculum.
- 2) Production of e-content in the form of digitized textbooks, animations and videos.
- 3) Sharing of e-contents through high bandwidth LAN, Wi-Fi, and Internet facilities.
- 4) Regular uploading of syllabus based e-contents to the college website for 24X7 hour access.
- 5) Computerized Library with Wi-Fi Zone, computer access points for students and teachers, digital photocopier machine, online access of NLIST books, college library catalogue.
- 6) Computer and digital technology based certificate course.
- 7) Creation of Smart Classroom using Smartboard, Computer to make the teaching-learning process more interactive.
- 8) Existence of digital media laboratory for creation, editing of econtents, project works, data collection and analysis, documentary film making (with sound-recording facility), and composing contents for college/departmental magazines.
- 9) Introduction of computer games for fun-filled and interactive learning process.


♦ To make ICT beneficial for teachers we have tech-integrated programmes for competency-linked teacher training through-

- 1) Internet for remote connection with peers and training from their subject experts.
- 2) Formation of Workgroup, Group e-mail, WhatsApp group, Facebook for knowledge and idea exchange amongst themselves.
- 3) Introduction of MGC Online Educational Resource Platform (MOERP) to empower them through creation of digital contents that include instructional videos, online coaching, and peer support.
- 4) Extensive training module for Staffs of the college to enable them as ICT conversant.

♦ To make ICT beneficial for Leadership and Governance and to follow the objective of 'Digital India' we have-

- 1) Online Admission system for both honours and general courses.
- 2) Computerized student management system which helps to record, maintain, track and analyse student level performance data. It also helps us to achieve institutional goals and teacher-classroom-specific goals.
- 3) Computerized Cash collection, Accounts and Payroll system for recording and analysis of financial data, and preparation of different Budgets.
- 4) Maintenance of information related with Governing Body, Finance, IQAC, and other Committee decisions.
- 5) Introduction of COSA through the Government of West Bengal.
- 6) Computerized Library information system.
- 7) Computerized Staff Attendance system through Biometric machine.
- 8) In process to implement fully computerised Management Information System, Service Book maintenance, Routine preparation, and allocation of examination duty.

• Immense potentiality to expand in future course of actions in the field of Academic, Research, and Administrative arena.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Lack of proper mindset to use ICT enabled systems by the teaching / non-teaching staffs.
- Shortage of ICT training facilities are there for the students teaching / non-teaching staffs.
- Time constraint is a major problem to explore ICT training paths. Teachers and students are mostly busy to attend their regular academic activities in and outside the college. If the college authority derives some strategic plan to release the teachers for practice of ICT, then only this practice will be effective for the institution.
- Students find it difficult to join ICT training modules as **regular study and examination assignments** are there in the college as per the Calcutta University guidelines.
- Majority of the subjects taught in the college do not have computer practical in main curriculum. As a result, these students are not in a position to have computer practical classes.
- Very difficult for a fund starved institution to expand ICT enabled activities in-spite of enormous scope to expand. The College mainly depends on UGC and State Government for major funding initiatives.

33. Teaching methods adopted to improve student learning:

1. Inter-departmental Faculty Exchange Programme

- a) Rabindranath Tagore's *Home and the World* is a prescribed text that the English Honours students study in their third year. The students of English and Journalism and Mass Communication Departments were shown Satyajit Ray's cinematic adaptation of this text. Dr.Madhumanti Maitra of the English Department introduced the film, talking about the treatment of the socio-political context and human drama and how the perspective shifts from the literary text to the film. She also talked about the deliberately changed denouement and the dynamics of interpretation thereof. The students of Journalism and Mass Communication Department found a direct relevance to their curriculum in the discussion on the mechanics of the cinematic adaptation of a literary text.
- b) An inter-departmental Faculty exchange programme was arranged with the Bengali department, in which Dr.Madhumanti Maitra taught the third year Bengali Honours students the finer points of Shakespearean Tragedy, as per their curriculum requirements. Professor Shukla Pathak, on behalf of the Bengali Department, presented a lecture on the socio-political context of Tagore's Home and the World for the Third Year English Honours students.

2. Increasing Awareness of Texts through the Representation of Other Media

The second year English Honours students were shown the 1999 Hoffman's film adaptation of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* on 28 September 2005. The film being a faithful version of the romantic comedy was greatly beneficial for the students. They also contributed their individual observations by riting a comparative analysis of the film and the text.

3. Quiz contests among the first year students to enliven the study of History of English Literature

4. Group Discussion on Shakespeare's Sonnets

5. Student seminar

A seminar was presented by the second year students of English Honours on History of English literature, which directly benefitted the First Year students. The presentations on **Romanticism** with special focus on **Shelley** and on the **Dark Lady Sonnets of Shakespeare**, were directly relevant on the curriculum. It was a useful variation on the teaching learning methodology which helped to generate new interest and enthusiasm in the curricular studies.

6. Micro-Teaching

- a) First Year English honours students taught their classmates 'Renaissance and its Features' on September 7, 2015, and Shakespeare's Sonnet No. 130 on October 14,2015. The students' active participation was the chief defining aspect of this endeavour. The teaching session was concluded with an interactive session with both the teacher and the students contributing interesting observations on Renaissance.





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E. Post-accreditation initiatives

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-1:

The mission of the college is the empowerment of women. Keeping this mission in view the college has set the specific objectives towards the overall development of the students and has made some strategic plans to implement those objectives.

OBJECTIVES

- Academic Excellence
- Capacity building through Co-curricular, Extra-curricular activities, Soft Skill Development and Career Oriented Training
- Development of social, moral, secular and ethical Values
- Creating the awareness of professional opportunity
- Awareness about Environment Sustainable development

Strategic Plans:

- **A. i)** The student profile is studied thoroughly and different care is taken for slow learners and advanced learners. The slow learners are provided with remedial classes and tutorials. Faculty takes individual care for the slow learners and continuous monitoring is provided.
- ii) Peer teaching is available and the advanced learners help the slow learners to keep pace with the curricular advancement.
- iii) Advancement learners are provided with special tutorial classes and ICT aided resources and training.
- **iv**) Students are provided with the books from general library, seminar library, morning library and **INFLIBENT for e-resources**. The college library also has a tie-up with the libraries of Calcutta University and Jadavpur University .Through peer-teaching the advanced learners can develop the ability of leadership and extending help to others.
- v) The teachers regularly interact with the students even beyond the class-time and try to help in their academic performance leading to excellence.
- B. i) For Soft Skill development the college has mainly focused in two areas keeping in mind the demand of the present job-market. Training in Spoken English and Basic Computer Skill are provided to all the students free of cost before and after the regular college time.
- **ii**) The Development of Communication is also very important. The teachers in the class hours and also beyond it try to help the students in developing the communication skill and confidence through interaction, group discussion, extempore etc.

- **iii**) Competitions are arranged in Debate, Extempore, and Quiz etc to boost up the confidence.
- iv) The Interactive Club and other clubs help the students by regular meeting and performing various activities.
- **C.** Development of social values helps the students to cope up with the community and environment. The college has an efficient **NSS Unit** through which the students participate in social outreach programmes. Through NCC also their training and skill develop and to mention here the college has the **NCC Unit** which is a quite a successful one.
- **D.** career oriented training are imparted through professional bodies. A Career Counseling Cell exists in the college and the regular feature of this cell is to create awareness among the students regarding the career oriented training. College arranges different seminars and workshops in this area where the professionals from different fields train the students. Special emphasis is given to the weaker section and the **SC/ST students**. The college has an arrangement with the Jute Technology Dept, under the University of Calcutta, where the students can get practical training and preference are given to SC/ST candidates.
- **E.Career Counseling and placement cell of the college** guide the students for future professions. The cell also provides information regularly regarding different opportunities for placement and profession. The college encourages the students to enter the job market, at the same time guides them to go for entrepreneurship too.

F.Self development is an utmost important part of student life. The students need to take care of health and fitness and regular trainings are necessary. College has arranged training in Yoga, Table Tennis and regular practice in track and field for the development of health and fitness. The college also has a facility of gymnasium which students use regularly. The NCC unit also helps the students to keep up with the fitness.

The **awareness of Environment** is equally important. This includes both physical and mental awareness. 'Go Green' club performs the activities regarding physical awareness. Taking some positive steps towards environmental cause is also done through NSS. This year (2015) the students insisted some of the Puja Pandals in South Calcutta and campaigned for 'Save Ganga' project.

The mental environment of the students needs to be taken care of. The teachers keep a regular vigilance to maintain a healthy atmosphere in college. Counseling of the students are done in different area among which personal counseling is also a part. Even the professional counselors are invited to conduct personal council for the students. The college also encourages in creative activities to maintain the healthy mental set up. Different cultural programmes are arranged by the students and also by the Students Union. All the students are encouraged to perform. The Cultural club, the Drama club etc give regular practice in this field. Competitions are also arranged in cultural

areas to encourage the students striving for excellence. An unique feature of the college is 'Ananda-Mela'- an exhibition by the students where they can put up the stalls for anything they can make and they can sell the products too. The students can also prepare some food stuff to sell in 'Ananda-Mela'. Especially the students who are not so interested in creating an academic career, but have other creative abilities are encouraged to participate in it.

The mission of the college being Woman Empowerment, the faculty try to prepare the students in such a manner that would help them both in their personal and professional life.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-2:

The college also feels the necessity of introducing new courses. In the post NAAC period, a few courses have been introduced. Honours have been introduced in Botany and Sociology and Film-Study and Statistics – General courses have been opened in 2005-2006. In the same year Alternative English has also been introduced. The immediate plan is to apply for the opening of Chemistry Honours and Zoology General. The future plan is to open Masters Degree under the University of Calcutta in a couple of subjects.

The college already has a **self financing course-Travel and Tourism Management**.

The college has also started a **3 months basic Computer Application Course, free of cost**; in near future the college has a plan to open some self-financing courses in Information and Technology and Computer Application.

In addition, the College started its journey as a **Regular Study Centre** (*Code 28140*) **of Indira Gandhi Open University** (**IGNOU, New Delhi**). Currently the College offers 11 Master Degree programmes, 1 Bachelor Degree program, 3 Post Graduate Diploma program, 1 Diploma program through IGNOU. UGC Add-On courses and many more programmes from IGNOU are in line of introduction by the College, very shortly.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-3:

In the post NAAC period the college has given a lot of emphasis for the accessibility of the students to computers. Of late the college has a proper Media and Computer Lab with 20 computers, where all the students can access computers with required software for their curriculum. All the Honours. Department also have desktop or laptops which are used by the faculty and students. The college has plan to provide more computer accessibility to both students and teachers, and to create a good computer centre.

A Career Counselling and Placement Cell also exist. Their primary duty is to create awareness among the students regarding career and profession. The Cell gives information, provides necessary training for career development, and arranges seminars and workshops initiating individual profession and institutions for guiding the students.

The college also takes care for the personal counseling of the students for creating a healthy atmosphere in the institution.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-4:

Student's feedback being very important element in addressing the student related matters properly; the college has designed a student feedback mechanism as per the instruction of UGC.

The college used to collect the Students Feedback verbally. The faculty was involved in taking Feedback from the students y interacting them in the class hours and beyond.

The formal mechanism for collecting Feedback is designing a form with relevant questions about all the arenas of the college. This form is also designed as per **UGC guidelines**. The forms are distributed and the students are encouraged to give their opinion freely and frankly. Then those feedback forms are collected and opened by the Principal and are analyzed with all the Head of the Departments. The analysis is also done with the Library and Office Staff. Finally decisions are taken for addressing the grievances and developing the situations suggested by the students. Of late the college has decided to go for another kind of feedback mechanism. Class representatives are chosen by the students from every year with whom the Principal goes for direct interaction. Sometimes some feedback forms are also given to them and the Principal directly finds out the feedback from the class representatives.

The feedback of the student is certainly helping the college in development in different areas.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-5:

The college has formalized of teachers and non-teaching staffs. IQAC initiated the process of filing the records related to upgradation of **Self-Appraisal facts** and **figures in a regular basis.**

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-6:

The library of this college is quite resourceful. Besides a good number of books, good magazines, journals are also available in the library. **The library has been COMPUTERISED and accessing the resources has become easier.** The library gives access to e-resourced through INFLIBNET and the access has been given to students and teachers.

The library timing has been increased and the Staff are cordial and cooperative to help the students.

The library also has a discussion of Morning Library, which is basically a Test Book Library, especially to the students belonging from economically challenged class. The Syllabus Question Papers and guide books are also available, so that the students can prepare themselves as per the curriculum.

The Seminar libraries in all the departments are a part of main library. These seminar libraries also have good members of Test and Reference Books and the students can instantly get help from such resources.

The college has an institutional membership of the American Center Library and hence the students and the faculty can use all the resources there. The main Library of the College also has the link with the libraries of The University of Calcutta and Jadavpur University, hence giving the access to these libraries too.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-7:

The College has taken sincere efforts in inviting Donor Agencies and Research Organisations to develop a separate Research Centre on the campus with more action oriented projects and academic publication. In addition we are expanding networks and collaborative initiatives with Governmental and Non-Governmental Organizations at the local, national and international levels.

Action taken against NAAC Recommendation-8:

Being the affiliated to the Calcutta University (CU), there is **no scope to introduce Board-of-Studies for Tourism & Travel Management-Vocational (TTMV) by the College. As CU does not have any Board-of-Studies for TTMV,** the College Service Commission is in no position to send full-time faculty for this course.

REPORT OF THE PEER TEAM ON THE INSTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION OF MURALIDHAR GIRLS COLLEGE KOLKATA, WEST BENGAL

Section - I : Preamble :

Muralidhar Girls College was established in July, 1940 as Ballygunj Girls College, which was renamed later as Muralidhar Girs' college is the name of its founder, Sri Muralidhar Bandopadhyaya. The college is situated in the heart of Kolkata city and was established with the aim of spreading education as a means of empowerment of women. The college was recognized by the UGC under 2(f) and 12(h) in 1974. It has been affiliated to the University of Calcutta since 1945.

The College has Arts and Science faculties, as two main streams with a total number of 15 departments. It has 10 Departments in Arts Faculty and 5 Departments in Science Faculty. It also offers one certificate programme. The faculty consists of 43 permanent teachers of which 16 have Ph.D. and 6 have M.Phil degrees. Besides, there are 23 part-time teachers and one temporary teacher. There are 33 administrative staff members in the College. The College has had an enrolment of 1400 students last year.

The institution has a Central Library, Computer Centre, Health Centre, Canteen, Grievance Redressal Cell besides facilities for Sports, Audio-Visual Delivery Mode, LCD Projector, Public Address System, Public Telephone Booth. The institution works under annual system. The dropout rate of students is around 10%. Its success rate is around 80%. The unit cost of education per student is Rs.10570/-.

The college has a Governing Body which consists of nominees of the university, state government teaching and non-teaching staff and other members of the academic community and, the Principal is the executive authority.



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The college volunteered for assessment and accreditation by NAAC, Bangalore and submitted its application in December, 2003. The NAAC constituted a peer team consisting of Prof. R.P. Kanshik, former Member CGC, Professor, School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, (Rtd.), New Delhi, as Chairperson. Prof. Sunit Kanta Behera, Dept. of Mass Communication and Journalism, Berhampur University, Berhampur, and Prof. D. Harinarayana, Director Incharge, School of Distance Education, Andhra University, Visakhapamam as Members. The visit was coordinated by Dr. K. Rama, Deputy Adviser, NAAC.

The Peer Team after analysing the self-study report visited the college on 16th and 17th February, 2004. The team during its visit considered the existing infrastructural facilities of the college and the relevant documents made available. The team also interacted with the College Community consisting of Students, Faculty, Administrative staff Alumni and Parents. The observations of the team, criterion-wise; are as follows:

Section - 2: Criterion-wise Analysis

Criterion - 1 : Curricular Aspects

The College offers UG courses in the two main streams of Arts and Science. The syllability is prepared by the University of Calcutta and followed by the College. However, teachers of the college are members of the Boards of Studies in History, Journalism, Bengali and Education, which enables them to think of innovations in syllabus. While there is no freedom in the syllabi, the student is given the flexibility in choosing options. The college offers 11 options in Honders, 14 options in General B.A. and one programme under Self-Finance. The college was one of the first institution to introduce



Journalism and Mass Communication and later Psychology and Geography Honours. Both the disciplines are notable induction in their curriculum. The institution has further initiated some of the elective programmes that have relevance to the Job oriented Courses. The college is yet to take initiative to get feedback from the academic peers and employers on the teaching programmes of the college.

Criterion - 2: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation

The College follows transparent admission paticy, and admissions are based on acudemic records of the candidates on 'first come first served' basis. The academic calendar and prospects are prepared in advance and communicated to the students in the beginning of the year. The medium of teaching is Bengali and English. The syllabus is divided into ropics and taught according to the plan given in the academic calendar. The teachers prepare the teaching plans and execute them. The use of Audio-visual technology is also prevalent here. The College works for 252 days in a year out of which 217 are teaching days. The teaching-learning process is closely mentioned by the Principal with the help of her team selected from faculty.

Keeping in view the inadequacy of the lecturing method, other interactive methods are also included viz., Practical Classes, Projects, Special Assignments, Seminars, and Quiz. Holding Tutorials, and class tests are part of regular teaching method. Besides, remedial classes are also arranged for slow learners. Such classes are held beyond college hours at no extra charge to the student. The bright students are encouraged in the form of awards and prizes.

The teachers are recruited according to the UGC and Government regulations. However, the college is free to appoint adhoc / temperary teachers depending upon the requirement for



which payment will be made from its own funds. Teachers are deputed regularly to attend refresher courses and orientation courses for their academic development. The formal and informal meetings between the teachers and the Principal, the Principal – teachers and the students, provides a scope for close monitoring of the students' performance. The feedback from the students is analysed and corrective measures are taken to improve teachers' performance. Moreover, the parent teacher meast also sids teaching learning process. Teachers are available for both academic and personal counselling of students. With around 80% success rate, the college has its performance higher than University average.

Criterion - 3: Research, Consultancy and Extension

The college provides necessary support to teachers by sanctioning study leave to do research and improve their qualifications while in service. One teacher in the Department of English is pursuing her Ph.D. at Oxford University. One teacher in Economics is pursuing Ph.D in the area of Environmental Economics, which has relevance to the local area. Some teachers of Journalism and Mass Communication, Bengali, English, Education, Economics, Psychology and Travel and Tourism Management have published textbooks and research papers

It is worth mentioning that the Department of English, Economics, Psychology and TTM have received finds for ongoing research projects from UGC, Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute and Department of Environment, Government of West Bengal. The students of J & MC and TTM are assigned project work as partial requirement of the degree which inculcates research aptitude in them.

The extension activities for the social uplifunent by the NSS. NCC units and the Drama
Club of the College need a special mention. The college conducts awareness programmes on
covironment, health, literacy with the active cooperation of NCOs and Government



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Agencies. The college plays a viral role in the upliffment of the disadvantaged sections of the society by organising awareness campaigns on comemporary social issues.

Criteriion -4: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is located in a small plot of land in South Kellona. The three-storied edifice with 24 rooms was constructed in 1957. An additional floor with 11 moons was added later. The college has acience tahs, good library, computer lab, students' common room and gyro. The library has 36,423 books besides 12 journals. The computerisation of the library is yet to pick up. There is no provision for inter-library loan facility. The college has a computer lab and administrative staff were given training with the help of CMC. Audio-visual aids, public addressing system, multi-media projector are also available. The existing infrastructure of the college is well managed with the help of development fund, building fund, rent from Andhra Bank extension counter located in the college and donations from other organisations. The Botany Department maintains a small botanical garden. The college does not have its own playground, instead it conducts its games and sports activities by sharing the playground of other institutions. A medical doctor, who is a member of the governing body offers free medical advice and provision is made for clinical check up and eye test. A doctor is available to attend the emergency cases. An alumnus of the college looks after Yoga and Karate.

Criterion -5: Student Support and Progression

The college has sufficient and well organised support services to ensure healthy growth of students. The prospectus is published annually. Admissions are made and the criteria for admissions are displayed on Notice Board and Prospectus of the college carries the same. The prospectus contains information relating to courses of study, free, infrastructural availability,



evaluation system, list of staff, list of awards and prizes, facilities offered by the college and composition of governing body. The institution offers financial aid to economically backward students in the form of full / half fee free studentship. Last year Rs. 86000/- was allocated towards Poor students' aid.

The college also provides free books and waives examination lies for needy students.

Ninety two students were benefited in the last year out of this first. The state government superals for ST and SC students are also available. The teachers offer academic counselling to the students. The College has an Alumni Association which organised an Eye Testing Camp, Workshop on Drama, Seminar on Literature and an Exhibition of Handicrafts last year. The College has a well functioning Drama Club to improve students' cultural and debating skills, which wen them laurels in many places.

The students also participate in the inter-college youth partiament and have won prizes for their excellent performance. Annual events cover music competition, publication of magazines, annual sports and cultural programmes. The students also organised programmes on national integration through songs and damess. NCC students participated in the Republic Day parades held both in Calcutta and Delhi. The Counselling cell in the college helps the students to face the professional world.

Criterion - 6: Organisation and Management

The Principal is the executive head, who is guided by the Governing Body constituted on the guidelines of Statute of the Calcutta University. The Principal is assisted by the Heads of the Departments, the Head clerk and sometimes by the students' union. The teachers help the Principal in administration, while the administrative staff discharge their duties efficiently. The college funds are managed by the Financial Committee of the governing body. The Bursar is



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entrusted with all responsibility of linance and accounting. The fees attricture which remained wintle for years was changed in 2001 and 2003 as suggested by the University and government. The Redressal Cell for which the Principal is 1 scharge solves galevances of all sections of the college. Cordial relationship exists among management, staff and students. The annual budget of the college is 135.78 takks for 2003-04.

Criterion - 7: Healthy Practices

The college is following some healthy practices which are noteworthy:

- Dynamic leadership along with good interpersonal relationships among teaching, non-teaching staff and students. They help each other in the smooth functioning of the College.
- The College encourages self-financing courses of contemporary relevance and the resources earned through these courses are well utilised.
- The establishment of a Students' Cooperative Society, a gymnasium and a Yoga drait
 Karate Centre validates the concern of the college for students' welfare and their physical
 and economic well-being.
- The NSS and NCC units of the college respond to the societal needs and are encouraged
 to organise socio-cultural awareness campaigns for the benefit of the socially and
 economically backward section of the society.



SECTION - 3: OVERALL ANALYSIS

The College has been successful in translating its vision and goal empowerment of women- by providing quality education to the girls of middle and lower middle class in Kolkata.

There are a number of features of Muralidhar Girls' College which reflect the quality assurance and standards that need to be commended. But it is necessary and appropriate to mention certain concerns of the Peer Team for the consideration of the institution.

The institution shall be commended for the following:

- The progress made by the college since its inception in 1940 and by its ability and determination to translate its vision and goals into reality in its pursuit of the advancement of knowledge in priority areas for the girls empowering it of women.
- Effective leadership and good interpersonal relationship resulting in efficient teamwork.
- Smooth functioning of the tutor-ward system that facilitates the magnitoring of the students, both academic and personal.
- Facilitating role of the institution to promote students, teachers and society participation in socio-cultural awareness and developmental programmes.
- Encouragement provided to the teachers for research and updation of their qualifications and knowledge.

While appreciating the offices of the college, the following suggestions/areas of concerneed to be considered by the college authorities for the growth and development of the college.



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- While appreciating the overall mission of the college, which is empowement of weather it tracks left that the college should identify specific objectives and make atrategic plane to actain the same.
- The college may explore the possibility of introducing more course options.
